**EXPLANATION**

Approval of this request will enable the State to continue participating in the AAICPC, which is a national bipartisan information and advocacy group that represents the needs of human social services. The work of the AAICPC supports the entire range of programs administered by the Department. The AAICPC is a reliable and valuable source of timely and accurate information regarding federal programs, federal funding, future directions, and interpretation of proposed laws and rules.

The Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children (ICPC) is the mechanism New Hampshire has to ensure protection and services to children who are placed across state lines for foster care, adoption, parental, relative and residential placements. The Interstate Compact is a uniform law that has been enacted by all 50 states, the District of Columbia and the U.S. Virgin Islands. It establishes orderly procedures for the interstate placement of children and fixes responsibility for those involved in placing the child.

The AAICPC represents the State before Congress and federal agencies on matters of concern to New Hampshire. With the many changes to federal programs being passed by Congress each year, it is increasingly important to have current information about those changes, their consequences and the potential impact on each state. The information available through the AAICPC is necessary for the efficient administration of our programs.

Listed below are answers to standard questions required for Governor and Executive Council

organization dues and membership approval submissions.

1. How long has this organization been in existence and how long has this agency been a member of this organization?

APHSA was founded in 1930 as the American Public Welfare Association and changed its name to APHSA in 1997. The New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services has been a member since 1990 and the NH Department of Health and Welfare was a member in the years prior to that. In 2015, the AAICPC Committee Members voted to separate from APHSA in regards to payment of dues and bill states independently.

2. Is there any other organization that provides the same or similar benefits which your agency belongs to?

3. How many other states belong to this organization and is your agency the sole New Hampshire state agency that is a member?

Agencies from all 50 states are members as well as the District of Columbia and US territories. The Department is the sole New Hampshire agency belonging to the AAICPC. All Divisions and Offices benefit from this membership.

4. How is the dues structure established? (Standard fee for all states, based on population, based on other criteria, etc)

A tiered payment system is in place and states are placed in one of three tiers based on state size and population. New Hampshire is in the smallest tier due to being a smaller state. New Hampshire is, therefore, required to pay the least amount that a state is required to pay.

5. What benefit does the state receive from participating in this membership?

AAICPC is the only association of the nation's top government human service executives from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and the territories, and their key state program managers, plus hundreds of county-level directors of human services throughout the nation, that is in place for the exchange of knowledge, data, best practices, policy review and development, networking and advocacy.

6. Are training or educational/ research materials included in the membership? If so, is the cost included? Explain in detail.

Yes. Included in the cost are educational/research materials the Department receives including, but are not limited to, *This Week in Washington*, Legislative Summaries, Policy Papers, Testimonies, E-mail Alerts and Technical Assistance.

7. Is the membership required in order to receive any federal grants or required in order to receive or participate in licensing or certification exams? Explain.

8. Is there any travel included with this membership fee? Explain in detail any travel to include the number of employees involved, the number of trips, destination if known and purposes of membership supported trips.

9. Which state agency employees are directly involved with this organization? (Indicate if they are members, voting members, committee members, and/or officers of the organization.)

New Hampshire has a designated Compact Administrator and Deputy Compact Administrator. Both administrators have voting privileges as members of the AAICPC. In 2016, New Hampshire's Compact Administrator was voted in as a member of the AAICPC Executive Committee.

10. Explain in detail any negative impact to the State if the Agency did not belong to this organization.

Not being a member of the AAICPC would negatively impact New Hampshire's ability to ensure safety; provide protection; and provide services to children when seeking placement out of state as well as to children who are placed within New Hampshire from other states.
