Your Excellency and Members of the Council:

REQUESTED ACTION

That approval be and hereby is given to the Attorney General to grant a salary increase to Dan A. Jimenez, Position #9U540 (Appropriation #02-20-20-200510-26100000-013-500132) as an Assistant Attorney General, from a salary level of \$86,000 to a salary level of \$92,000 effective upon Governor and Executive Council approval or December 2, 2022, whichever is later.

EXPLANATION

Mr. Jimenez, a resident of Bedford, graduated from Guilford College in 2009 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science (concentration in Economics). While studying there, he played rugby and was elected to the Student Senate. He earned his Juris Doctor in May 2012 from Suffolk University Law School, where he was an officer in the Student Bar Association and member of the Latin American Law Student Association. Mr. Jimenez tried more than 40 jury trials and more than 50 bench trials as an Assistant District Attorney at the Plymouth County District Attorney's Office in Brockton, Massachusetts, between January 2013 and February 2019. In addition to his own caseload, he supervised other attorneys prosecuting in the Brockton, Wareham, and Plymouth District Courts. He was a founding member of the District Attorney's Diversity and Inclusion Internal Committee. Mr. Jimenez served as an Assistant Attorney General in the White Collar and Public Integrity Division of the Massachusetts Attorney General's Office from February 2019 until joining the Department in November 2020. He has been assigned to the Criminal Justice Bureau's Public Integrity Unit since that time. I am designating him as a Senior Assistant Attorney General and assigning him to serve as Chief of the Public Integrity Unit. Commensurate with his new duties and responsibilities, his salary will increase by \$6,000 from \$86,000 to \$92,000. A copy of his resume is attached.
