REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Information Technology to enter into a **Sole Source** contract amendment with The Atom Group, LLC, of Portsmouth, NH (VC #313392) by increasing the price limitation by \$238,936.40 from \$210,000 to \$448,936.40 for the purpose of providing additional hours of cybersecurity negotiations and assessments for the State of New Hampshire, effective upon Governor and Council approval through the original completion date of December 31, 2026. The Governor and Executive Council approved the original contract agreement on October 4, 2022, Item #15. Source of Funds: 100% Federal Grant.

Funds are available in the following account for State Fiscal Year 2024.

EXPLANATION

This request is sole source because MOP 150 requires all amendments to agreements previously approved as sole source to be identified as sole source. This amendment renews 200 hours of cyber negotiations on retainer for one year and increases the hours of cybersecurity testing and remediation available for the next three years. This contract amendment accelerates the State's implementation of Cyber Self-Insurance and has significant pricing advantages for the state as the rates for the services to the public sector have already been negotiated and significantly discounted. The discounted rates from a trusted partner are available only because this contract leverages an existing Public-Private partnership formed by the New Hampshire Public Risk Management Exchange's (PRIMEX) Risk Managers with The Atom Group, LLC.

The State's Cyber Self-Insurance framework benefits all Agencies across the Executive Branch. By leveraging and strengthening the Public-Private Partnership used by more than 550 Lower Political

Subdivisions, working relationships and knowledge sharing between the State and Municipalities will improve. With continuous cybersecurity assessments, the State will reduce overall risk and by increasing situational awareness of Cyber Security weaknesses that can be remediated or mitigated before an incident occurs.

The Department of Information Technology respectfully requests approval of this contract amendment.

CONTRACT AMENDMENT 1

This CONTRACT AMENDMENT 1 is entered into as of the date of the last signature below by and between the STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE, acting through its Department of Information Technology ("State"), and THE ATOM GROUP, LLC, a New Hampshire limited liability company with a principal place of business located at 33 Jewell Court, Portsmouth, New Hampshire 03801 ("Contractor"). State and Contractor are some sometimes referred to herein singularly as a "Party" or collectively as the "Parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, pursuant to an Agreement approved by Governor and Council, as a sole source contract on October 4, 2022, Item #15, (the "Agreement"), the State agreed to pay Contractor in exchange for Contractor's services as further specified in said Agreement;

WHEREAS, the Parties intended that the Price Limitation of \$210,000.00 set forth at Section 1.8 of the Agreement was to be paid to Contractor in advance as a retainer for the services that Contractor was to furnish during the then current State Fiscal Year of 2023;

WHEREAS, the Parties further intended that said Price Limitation was to apply only to the then current State Fiscal Year of 2023, and that the State would replenish said retainer as needed for each successive State Fiscal Year throughout the Term of the Agreement;

WHEREAS, the terms and conditions of the Agreement were not consistent with the Parties intent as specified above;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 17 of the Agreement, the Parties wish to amend the Agreement to make it consistent with their intent as specified above, and to further increase the Price Limitation by an additional \$238,936.40 to be deposited with Contractor in advance as a retainer for Contractor's services to be furnished during the now current State Fiscal Year of 2024;

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration exchanged, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby conclusively acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. The current Price Limitation of \$210,000.00 as set forth at Section 1.8 of the State of New Hampshire P-37 General Provisions shall be deleted in its entirety and replaced with \$448,936.40 as the new Price Limitation, representing a total increase of \$238,936.40.

Any request for additional retainer shall be Subject to the terms and conditions of Section I of Amended Exhibit C to this Agreement.

5. Except as provided herein, all provisions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect. This modification shall take effect upon the approval date from the Governor and the Executive Council.



1. Cyber Negotiation Services. The Contractor shall provide two hundred (200) hours of the services described in Section 1 (collectively, the “Cyber Negotiation Services”) for each State Fiscal Year during the Term. Such Cyber Negotiation Services shall include the following:

1.1. Advanced Threat Actor Negotiations. Contractor shall provide advanced threat actor negotiations in up to six of the languages set forth below in house at the Contractor’s office and two other languages via pre-defined translation services:

- 1.1.1. English (Native/Fluent);
- 1.1.2. Spanish (Native/Fluent);
- 1.1.3. French (Native/Fluent);
- 1.1.4. Hungarian (Native/Fluent);
- 1.1.5. Slovak (Native/Fluent);
- 1.1.6. Cantonese (Native/Fluent);
- 1.1.7. Russian (translation); and
- 1.1.8. Mandarin (translation).

1.2. Office for Foreign Asset Control Validation Process. Office for Foreign Asset Control requires validation of attribution of any payment being made to a foreign entity for ransom. In the event of a ransom payment request, the Contractor will perform the following:

1.2.1. Validate with internal counsel that the payment would not be made to any person(s) appearing on the U.S. Department of Treasury’s Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) Specially Designated Nationals and Blocked Persons List (SDN List) or countries subject to comprehensive sanctions programs administered by OFAC, including Crimea, Cuba, Iran, North Korea, and Syria.

1.2.2. Validate with internal counsel that the payment will not be made to further a terrorist organization or enterprise, e.g., no clear evidence of links to proscribed groups (i.e., “Foreign Terrorist Organizations” under Section 219 of the Immigration and Nationality Act, 8 U.S.C. Section 1189).

1.2.3. Perform an engineering review of the blockchain with specific analysis of the attacker’s bitcoin address; review prior transactional history; review all transaction hashes in the wallet to identify other ransoms paid to this attacker and whether the attacker is targeting a specific sector or geographical area.

1.2.4. Cross reference all discovered attributes against any proprietary database of attackers used in prior attacks or linked to known criminal groups in Dark Web Marketplaces, Forums, or Scrapes.

1.2.5. Perform an engineering review of the attack vector for known patterns, attribution, or links to countries or advanced persistent threat groups (APT).

1.2.6. Determine (by reverse engineering, signature analysis, and Internet research) whether the malware variant is linked to known attackers or groups or contains code that could indicate an attacker's geographical location or native language.

1.2.7. Review language, translations, English proficiency, Time zone, IP addresses, and geolocation indicators to try to determine geographical location and/or whether an attacker is deliberately masking their identity or pretending to come from a different location, Language, or country.

1.2.8. Complete liaising on "no-names" basis with law enforcement to determine if similar attacks/ransom demands have been linked to terrorist/proscribed groups.

1.3. Gemini Digital Currency Transactions.

1.3.1 With approval from the State CISO or CIO, ATOM will process requested digital currency transfer in a normal negotiation where ATOM will accept wire transfer of funds from the State of New Hampshire Department of Information Technology and process those funds through Gemini for transfer to a threat actor as directed by the State of New Hampshire Department of Information Technology. ATOM will accept responsibility for transferring funds up to \$2,500,000.00 USD.

1.3.2. In an emergency context, such as when a deal can be made with a threat actor for a lower price if funds can be transferred quickly, or if negotiations require swift payment to successfully complete, Contractor will make emergency transfers up to \$50,000.00 USD within 12 hours, or up to \$100,000.00 USD in 24 hours. Emergency funds may be requested to pay a partial or full payment of ransom request pending the successful completion of OFAC Due Diligence. The State of New Hampshire Department of Information Technology may only request one emergency payment at a time and may not request a second emergency request unless the previous funding is fully reimbursed.

1.4. In the event that Contractor shall provide less than two hundred (200) hours of Cyber Negotiation Services for the then current State Fiscal Year, the remaining hours may be used for onsite and remote emergency remediation services, which include incident command, law enforcement coordination, engineering quarantine, isolation, sandbox testing, forensic collection, threat actor attribution, attack vector identification, and inoculation of the environment. All onsite and remote services and capabilities will be at the disposal of the State of New Hampshire

Department of Information Technology. Additionally, unused hours may be added to the Technical Auditing Services described below.

2. Technical Auditing Services. The Contractor shall also provide one hundred (100) hours of technical auditing service as described in this Section 2 (collectively, the “Technical Auditing Services”) for each State Fiscal Year during the Term, in an on-demand capacity and as coordinated with the State Chief Information Security Officer. Contractor shall provide technical auditing services in four parts:

2.1 Engineering Testing. Contractor shall use vulnerability assessments and penetration testing techniques. Technical auditing occurs at all levels of the infrastructure, from perimeter, to application, to network (all layers), design, architecture, and use of cryptography. Technical auditing is often aided by tools for vulnerability analysis, penetration testing, and static scanning (Veracode).

2.2 Compliance Auditing. Contractor shall perform compliance auditing by performing compliance gap analysis for cybersecurity and regulatory frameworks such as The Center for Internet Security Version 8, The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR/GDPR EU), HIPAA, HITRUST, ISO 27001, FERPA, COPPA, PIPEDA, and numerous state and federal regulations to name a few.

2.3 Privacy Auditing. Contractor shall perform privacy audits for governance, collection, and processing of personal information.

2.4 Remediations. Contractor shall work with DoIT to guide remediation activity, perform the remediation for you at your request, or align you with subject matter experts that will be well versed in taking care of a specific issue.

3. Activity, Deliverables, and Milestones. The hours used for Technical Auditing Services will be agreed upon in writing between the Contractor and the State Chief Information Security Officer before work commences and the deliverables are subject to the provisions below.

4. Deliverable Review and Acceptance.

4.1 Non-Software and Written Deliverables Review and Acceptance. The Contractor shall provide a written Certification that a non-software, written deliverable (such as the Test Plan) is final, complete, and ready for Review. After receiving such Certification from the Contractor, the State will Review the Deliverable to determine whether it meets the requirements outlined in this Exhibit. The State will notify the Contractor in writing of its Acceptance or rejection of the Deliverable, or its partial or conditional Acceptance of the Deliverable, within five (5) business days of the State’s receipt of the Contractor’s written Certification; provided that if the State determines that the State needs more than five (5) days, then the State shall be entitled to an extension of up to an additional ten (10) business days. If the State rejects the Deliverable or any portion of the Deliverable, or if any Acceptance by the State is conditioned upon completion of any related matter, then the State shall notify the Contractor of the nature and class of the Deficiency, or the terms of the conditional Acceptance, and the Contractor shall correct the Deficiency or

resolve the condition to Acceptance within the period identified in the Work Plan. If no period for the Contractor's correction of the Deliverable or resolution of condition is identified, the Contractor shall correct the Deficiency in the Deliverable or resolve the condition within five (5) business days or such longer period as the State (in its sole discretion) may agree. Upon receipt of the corrected Deliverable, the State shall have five (5) business days to review the Deliverable and notify the Contractor of its Acceptance, Acceptance in part, conditional Acceptance, or rejection thereof, with the option to extend the Review Period up to five (5) additional business days, or mutually agreed upon timeframe. If the Contractor fails to correct the Deficiency within the allotted period, the State may, at its option, continue reviewing the Deliverable and require the Contractor to continue until the Deficiency is corrected, or immediately terminate the Contract, declare the Contractor in default, and or pursue its remedies at law and in equity.

4.2. Software Deliverables Review and Acceptance. System/Software Testing and Acceptance shall be performed as set forth in the Test Plan and more particularly described in Acceptance and Testing Services described herein.

4.3 Number of Deliverables. Unless the State otherwise specifically agrees in writing, in no event shall the Contractor certify for testing and deliver to the State more than three (3) Deliverables for review or testing at one time. As the State accepts a Deliverable, an additional Deliverable may be presented for review but at no time can the Deliverables exceed three (3) at a time without the authorization of the State.

4.4 Conditional and Unconditional Acceptance. By accepting a Deliverable, the State reserves the right to reject any and all Deliverables in the event the State detects any Deficiency in the System, in whole or in part, through completion of all Acceptance Testing, including but not limited to, Software/System Acceptance Testing, and any extensions thereof.

5. Change Orders.

5.1. The State may make changes, revisions, or request enhancements to the Statement of Work at any time by written Change Order. The State originated changes, revisions or enhancements shall be approved by the Department of Information Technology. Within five (5) business days of Contractor's receipt of a Change Order, Contractor shall advise the State, in detail, of any impact on cost (e.g., increase or decrease), the Schedule, and the Work Plan.

5.2. Contractor may propose a change within the scope of the Contract by written Change Order, identifying any impact on cost, the Schedule, and the Work Plan. The State shall acknowledge receipt of Contractor's requested Change Order within five (5) business days. The State Agency, as well as the Department of Information Technology, must review and approve all Change Orders in writing. The State shall be deemed to have rejected the Change Order if the Parties are unable to reach an agreement in writing within 30 days of receipt of the Change Order.

5.3. Change orders resulting in an increase of Price Limitation, an extension of time for Contract completion or a significant change to the scope of the Contract may require approval by the Governor and Council.

5.4. A Change Order which is accepted and executed by both Parties, and if applicable approved by Governor and Council, shall amend the terms of this Agreement.

6. Implementation of Services.

6.1. The Contractor shall employ an industry-standard Implementation strategy with a timeline set forth in accordance with the Work Plan.

6.2. The Contractor shall manage Project execution and provide the tools needed to create and manage the Project's Work Plan and tasks, manage and schedule Project staff, track and manage issues, manage changing requirements, maintain communication within the Project Team, and Report status.

6.3. The Contractor and the State shall adopt a Change Management approach to identify and plan key strategies, communication initiatives, and training plans.

7. Project Management.

7.1. The Contractor shall provide project tracking tools and templates to record and manage Issues, Risks, Change Requests, Requirements, and other documents used in the management and tracking of the project. The State believes that effective communication and Reporting are essential to Project success. The Contractor shall employ effective communication and Reporting strategies to ensure Project success. The Contractor Key Project Staff shall participate in meetings as requested by the State, in accordance with the requirements and terms of this Contract.

7.2. The Project requires the coordinated efforts of a Project Team consisting of both Contractor and State personnel. Contractor shall provide all necessary resources to perform its obligations under the Contract. Contractor is responsible for providing all appropriate resources and personnel to manage this Project to a successful completion.

7.3. The Contractor shall conduct criminal background checks and not utilize any staff, including subcontractors, to fulfill the obligations of the contract who have been convicted of any crime of dishonesty, including but not limited to criminal fraud, or otherwise convicted of any felony or misdemeanor offense for which incarceration for up to 1 year is an authorized penalty. The Contractor shall promote and maintain an awareness of the importance of securing the State's information among the Contractor's employees and agents.

7.4. The State may, at its sole expense, conduct reference and background screening of the Contractor's Project Manager and Key Project Staff. The State shall maintain the confidentiality of background screening results in accordance with the Contract Agreement.

7.5. The Contractor shall be responsible for knowledge transfer between all Contractor project teams for all deliverables defined in this Project Agreement.

Contractor's selection of the Project Manager shall be subject to the prior written approval of the State. The State's approval process may include, without limitation, at the State's discretion, review of the proposed Project Manager's resume, qualifications, references, and background checks, and an interview. The State may require removal or reassignment of Project Manager who, in the sole judgment of the State, is found unacceptable or is not performing to the State's satisfaction.

Project Manager must be qualified to perform the obligations required of the position under the Contract, shall have full authority to make binding decisions under the Contract, and shall function as Contractor's representative for all administrative and management matters. Project Manager must be available to promptly respond during normal Business Hours within Two (2) hours of inquiries from the State, and be at the site as needed. Project Manager must work diligently and use his/ her best efforts on the Project.

8.3. Change of Project Manager. Contractor may not replace the Project Manager or change its assignment of Project Manager without providing the State written notice and obtaining the prior approval of the State of the replacement Project Manager. State approvals for replacement of Project Manager shall not be unreasonably withheld. The replacement Project Manager is subject to the same requirements and Review as set forth above. Contractor shall assign a replacement Project Manager within ten (10) business days of the departure of the prior Project Manager, and Contractor shall continue during the ten (10) business day period to provide competent project management Services through a qualified interim Project Manager.

removal or reassignment of Key Project Staff who are found unacceptable to the State. Contractor shall not change Key Project Staff commitments without providing the State written notice and obtaining the prior written approval of the State. The State Project Manager's duties shall include the following: (a) Leading the Project; (b) Engaging and managing all Contractors working on the Project; (c) Managing significant issues and risks; (d) Reviewing and accepting Contract Deliverables; (e) Invoice sign-offs; (f) Review and approval of Change Orders; and (g) Managing stakeholders' concerns.

10. Work Plan. If hours under this contract are used for services other than Cyber Negotiation Services or Technical Auditing Services, a workplan will be developed and agreed upon by the CISO and Contractor in advance.

11. Data Protection. Protection of personal privacy and data shall be an integral part of the business activities of the Contractor to ensure there is no inappropriate or unauthorized use of State information at any time. To this end, the Contractor shall safeguard the confidentiality, integrity and availability of State information and comply with the following conditions:

The Contractor shall implement and maintain appropriate administrative, technical and organizational security measures to safeguard against unauthorized access, disclosure or theft of Personal Data and non-public information. Such security measures shall be in accordance with recognized industry practice and not less stringent than the measures the Contractor applies to its own Personal Data and non-public data of similar kind.

11.2. All data obtained by the Contractor in the performance of this contract and all Personal Data shall be encrypted at rest and in transit with controlled access. Unless otherwise stipulated, the Contractor is responsible for encryption of the Personal Data.

11.3. Unless otherwise stipulated, the Contractor shall encrypt all non-public data at rest and in transit. The State shall identify data it deems as non-public data to the Contractor. The level of protection and encryption for all non-public data shall be identified and made a part of this contract.

At no time shall any data or processes that either belong to or are intended for the use of the State or its officers, agents or employees – be copied, disclosed or retained by the Contractor or any party related to the Contractor for subsequent use in any transaction that does not include the State.

11.5. The Contractor shall not use any information collected in connection with the service issued from this Contract for any purpose other than fulfilling the service.

12. Data Location. The Contractor shall provide its than Cyber Negotiation Services and Technical Auditing Services to the State and its end users solely from data centers within the Continental United States. All storage, processing and transmission of State data shall be restricted to information technology systems within the Continental United States. The Contractor shall not allow its personnel or sub-contractors to store State data on portable devices, including personal computers, except as specified and allowed by the contract, and then only on devices that are used and kept at its data centers within the Continental United States. The Contractor shall permit its personnel and Contractors to access State data remotely only to provide technical support and as specified or required by the contract.

13. Security Incident or Data Breach. The Contractor shall inform the State of any security incident or Data Breach in accordance with NH RSA Chapter 359-C:20: Notice of Security Breach..

13.1. Incident Response. The Contractor may need to communicate with outside parties regarding a security incident, which may include contacting law enforcement, fielding media inquiries and seeking external expertise as mutually agreed upon, defined by law or contained in the Contract. Discussing security incidents with the State should be handled on an urgent as-needed basis, as part of the Contractor communication and mitigation processes as mutually agreed upon, defined by law or contained in the contract.

13.2. Security Incident Reporting Requirements. The Contractor shall report a security incident to the State identified contact immediately if it reasonably believes there has been a security incident.

13.3. Breach Reporting Requirements. If the Contractor has actual knowledge of a confirmed data breach that affects the security of any State content that is subject to applicable data breach notification law, the Contractor shall (1) promptly notify the appropriate State identified contact within 24 hours or sooner, unless shorter time is required by applicable law, and (2) take commercially reasonable measures to address the data breach in a timely manner.

13.3. Breach Responsibilities. This Section 13 only applies when a Data Breach occurs with respect to State data within the possession or control of the Contractor and/or the third party designee hosting the data as agreed upon by the Contractor and the State.

13.4 The Contractor, unless stipulated otherwise, shall immediately notify the appropriate State identified contact by telephone in accordance with the agreed upon security plan or security procedures if it reasonably believes there has been a security incident.

EXHIBIT C – PRICE AND PAYMENT SCHEDULE

1. Retainer.

1.1. The State agrees to pay Contractor a refundable retainer in the amount of Two Hundred Thirty-Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Thirty-Six and 40/100 Dollars (\$238,936.40), which will be deemed an advance for all fees and costs to be incurred by Contractor during the State Fiscal Year of 2024 in providing the Cyber Negotiation Services and Technical Auditing Services in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract. This initial retainer, as well as any future amounts requested by Contractor as an additional retainer, will be held in a separate deposit account (the "Trust Account") maintained by Contractor. Contractor agrees that any funds provided by the State as a retainer shall not be comingled with any other funds. The State authorizes the Contractor to Counsel to withdraw any amounts held in the Trust Account to pay the fees and other charges, as described below, as they become due.

1.2. The sums paid to Contractor as the initial retainer have been appropriated only to pay for the costs of the Cyber Negotiation Services and Technical Auditing Services provided by Contractor during the State Fiscal Year of 2024. For each subsequent State Fiscal Year during the Contract Term, Contractor may request an additional retainer for each subsequent State Fiscal Year.

1.3. In the event that any sums held as retainer are depleted prior to the end of the State Fiscal Year for which the sums have been appropriated, the Contractor shall immediately notify the State and cease all services. Contractor may request the State for additional retainer to cover the cost of any services to be rendered for the remainder of the then current State Fiscal Year.

1.4. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that any requests for additional retainer shall be subject to the approval of the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire.

2. Contractor's Fees. The State shall pay Contractor by the hour at the rates set forth below for all time spent in providing the Cyber Negotiation Services and Technical Auditing Services hereunder. Contractor's hourly rates are as follows:

- For services rendered between 8:00 AM – 6:00 PM ET \$175.00 per hour; and
- For services rendered between 6:01 PM – 7:59 AM ET \$220.00 per hour.

3. Travel Expenses. The State will not be responsible for any travel or out of pocket expenses incurred in the performance of the Cyber Negotiation Services and Technical Auditing Services performed under this Contract. The Contractor must assume all travel and related expenses incurred by Contractor in performance of its obligations. All labor rates in this Agreement will be considered "Fully Loaded", including, but not limited to meals, hotel/housing, airfare, car rentals, car mileage, and any additional out of pocket expenses.

EXPLANATION

This contract is sole source because it accelerates the State's implementation of Cyber Self-Insurance and has significant pricing advantages for the state as the rates for the services to the public sector have already been negotiated and significantly discounted. The discounted rates from a trusted partner are available only because this contract leverages an existing Public-Private partnership formed by the New Hampshire Public Risk Management Exchange's (PRIMEX) Risk Managers with The ATOM GROUP LLC.

When PRIMEX evaluated potential service providers for their municipal members, they looked closely at multiple firms and chose to form the partnership with Atom Group informed by the following:

1. ATOM is a New Hampshire company recommended to PRIMEX by New Era, a previous managed service provider they used for various services.
2. The recommendation resulted in a partnership to provide Cybersecurity Audits for five Members (two towns, one city, one county, and one school district) with the intent of providing a baseline of the cybersecurity maturity of PRIMEX' Membership.

3. Through this engagement, and because of ATOM's position as a New Hampshire company, their employee professionalism, timely response, job knowledge, and positive interaction with Members of the Exchange, PRIMEX engaged ATOM to begin work as a forensic first responder.
4. Further vetting was done by PRIMEX reinsurer, Beazley, prior to ATOM's final approval. Both PRIMEX and Beazley conducted a review of employee backgrounds, relevant certifications, and clearances to ensure a sustainable partnership could be formed.
5. Beazley also reviewed ATOM's capabilities and capacity as a forensic first response provider to include their billing rates, and ultimately approved them for use in New Hampshire by PRIMEX on behalf of more than 550 Lower Political Subdivisions.

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


2. SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED. The State of New Hampshire, acting through the agency identified in block 1.1 ("State"), engages contractor identified in block 1.3 ("Contractor") to perform, and the Contractor shall perform, the work or sale of goods, or both, identified and more particularly described in the attached EXHIBIT B which is incorporated herein by reference ("Services").

3. EFFECTIVE DATE/COMPLETION OF SERVICES.

3.1 Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, and subject to the approval of the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire, if applicable, this Agreement, and all obligations of the parties hereunder, shall become effective on the date the Governor and Executive Council approve this Agreement as indicated in block 1.17, unless no such approval is required, in which case the Agreement shall become effective on the date the Agreement is signed by the State Agency as shown in block 1.13 ("Effective Date").

3.2 If the Contractor commences the Services prior to the Effective Date, all Services performed by the Contractor prior to the Effective Date shall be performed at the sole risk of the Contractor, and in the event that this Agreement does not become effective, the State shall have no liability to the Contractor, including without limitation, any obligation to pay the Contractor for any costs incurred or Services performed. Contractor must complete all Services by the Completion Date specified in block 1.7.

4. CONDITIONAL NATURE OF AGREEMENT.

Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, all obligations of the State hereunder, including, without limitation, the continuance of payments hereunder, are contingent upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds affected by any state or federal legislative or executive action that reduces, eliminates or otherwise modifies the appropriation or availability of funding for this Agreement and the Scope for Services provided in EXHIBIT B, in whole or in part. In no event shall the State be liable for any payments hereunder in excess of such available appropriated funds. In the event of a reduction or termination of appropriated funds, the State shall have the right to withhold payment until such funds become available, if ever, and shall have the right to reduce or terminate the Services under this Agreement immediately upon giving the Contractor notice of such reduction or termination. The State shall not be required to transfer funds from any other account or source to the Account identified in block 1.6 in the event funds in that Account are reduced or unavailable.

5. CONTRACT PRICE/PRICE LIMITATION/ PAYMENT.

5.1 The contract price, method of payment, and terms of payment are identified and more particularly described in EXHIBIT C which is incorporated herein by reference.

5.2 The payment by the State of the contract price shall be the only and the complete reimbursement to the Contractor for all expenses, of whatever nature incurred by the Contractor in the performance hereof, and shall be the only and the complete compensation to the Contractor for the Services. The State shall have no liability to the Contractor other than the contract price.

5.3 The State reserves the right to offset from any amounts otherwise payable to the Contractor under this Agreement those liquidated amounts required or permitted by N.H. RSA 80:7 through RSA 80:7-c or any other provision of law.

5.4 Notwithstanding any provision in this Agreement to the contrary, and notwithstanding unexpected circumstances, in no event shall the total of all payments authorized, or actually made hereunder, exceed the Price Limitation set forth in block 1.8.

6. COMPLIANCE BY CONTRACTOR WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS/ EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.

6.1 In connection with the performance of the Services, the Contractor shall comply with all applicable statutes, laws, regulations, and orders of federal, state, county or municipal authorities which impose any obligation or duty upon the Contractor, including, but not limited to, civil rights and equal employment opportunity laws. In addition, if this Agreement is funded in any part by monies of the United States, the Contractor shall comply with all federal executive orders, rules, regulations and statutes, and with any rules, regulations and guidelines as the State or the United States issue to implement these regulations. The Contractor shall also comply with all applicable intellectual property laws.

6.2 During the term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall not discriminate against employees or applicants for employment because of race, color, religion, creed, age, sex, handicap, sexual orientation, or national origin and will take affirmative action to prevent such discrimination.

6.3 The Contractor agrees to permit the State or United States access to any of the Contractor's books, records and accounts for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with all rules, regulations and orders, and the covenants, terms and conditions of this Agreement.

7. PERSONNEL.

7.1 The Contractor shall at its own expense provide all personnel necessary to perform the Services. The Contractor warrants that all

personnel engaged in the Services shall be qualified to perform the Services, and shall be properly licensed and otherwise authorized to do so under all applicable laws.

7.2 Unless otherwise authorized in writing, during the term of this Agreement, and for a period of six (6) months after the Completion Date in block 1.7, the Contractor shall not hire, and shall not permit any subcontractor or other person, firm or corporation with whom it is engaged in a combined effort to perform the Services to hire, any person who is a State employee or official, who is materially involved in the procurement, administration or performance of this Agreement. This provision shall survive termination of this Agreement.

7.3 The Contracting Officer specified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, shall be the State's representative. In the event of any dispute concerning the interpretation of this Agreement, the Contracting Officer's decision shall be final for the State.

8. EVENT OF DEFAULT/REMEDIES.

8.1 Any one or more of the following acts or omissions of the Contractor shall constitute an event of default hereunder ("Event of Default"):

- 8.1.1 failure to perform the Services satisfactorily or on schedule;
- 8.1.2 failure to submit any report required hereunder; and/or
- 8.1.3 failure to perform any other covenant, term or condition of this Agreement.

8.2 Upon the occurrence of any Event of Default, the State may take any one, or more, or all, of the following actions:

8.2.1 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and requiring it to be remedied within, in the absence of a greater or lesser specification of time, thirty (30) days from the date of the notice; and if the Event of Default is not timely cured, terminate this Agreement, effective two (2) days after giving the Contractor notice of termination;

8.2.2 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and suspending all payments to be made under this Agreement and ordering that the portion of the contract price which would otherwise accrue to the Contractor during the period from the date of such notice until such time as the State determines that the Contractor has cured the Event of Default shall never be paid to the Contractor;

8.2.3 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and set off against any other obligations the State may owe to the Contractor any damages the State suffers by reason of any Event of Default; and/or

8.2.4 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default, treat the Agreement as breached, terminate the Agreement and pursue any of its remedies at law or in equity, or both.

8.3. No failure by the State to enforce any provisions hereof after any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of its rights with

regard to that Event of Default, or any subsequent Event of Default. No express failure to enforce any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of the right of the State to enforce each and all of the provisions hereof upon any further or other Event of Default on the part of the Contractor.

9. TERMINATION.

9.1 Notwithstanding paragraph 8, the State may, at its sole discretion, terminate the Agreement for any reason, in whole or in part, by thirty (30) days written notice to the Contractor that the State is exercising its option to terminate the Agreement.

9.2 In the event of an early termination of this Agreement for any reason other than the completion of the Services, the Contractor shall, at the State's discretion, deliver to the Contracting Officer, not later than fifteen (15) days after the date of termination, a report ("Termination Report") describing in detail all Services performed, and the contract price earned, to and including the date of termination. The form, subject matter, content, and number of copies of the Termination Report shall be identical to those of any Final Report described in the attached EXHIBIT B. In addition, at the State's discretion, the Contractor shall, within 15 days of notice of early termination, develop and submit to the State a Transition Plan for services under the Agreement.

10. DATA/ACCESS/CONFIDENTIALITY/PRESERVATION.

10.1 As used in this Agreement, the word "data" shall mean all information and things developed or obtained during the performance of, or acquired or developed by reason of, this Agreement, including, but not limited to, all studies, reports, files, formulae, surveys, maps, charts, sound recordings, video recordings, pictorial reproductions, drawings, analyses, graphic representations, computer programs, computer printouts, notes, letters, memoranda, papers, and documents, all whether finished or unfinished.

10.2 All data and any property which has been received from the State or purchased with funds provided for that purpose under this Agreement, shall be the property of the State, and shall be returned to the State upon demand or upon termination of this Agreement for any reason.

10.3 Confidentiality of data shall be governed by N.H. RSA chapter 91-A or other existing law. Disclosure of data requires prior written approval of the State.

11. CONTRACTOR'S RELATION TO THE STATE. In the performance of this Agreement the Contractor is in all respects an independent contractor, and is neither an agent nor an employee of the State. Neither the Contractor nor any of its officers, employees, agents or members shall have authority to bind the

State or receive any benefits, workers' compensation or other emoluments provided by the State to its employees.

12. ASSIGNMENT/DELEGATION/SUBCONTRACTS.

12.1 The Contractor shall not assign, or otherwise transfer any interest in this Agreement without the prior written notice, which shall be provided to the State at least fifteen (15) days prior to the assignment, and a written consent of the State. For purposes of this paragraph, a Change of Control shall constitute assignment. "Change of Control" means (a) merger, consolidation, or a transaction or series of related transactions in which a third party, together with its affiliates, becomes the direct or indirect owner of fifty percent (50%) or more of the voting shares or similar equity interests, or combined voting power of the Contractor, or (b) the sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the Contractor.

12.2 None of the Services shall be subcontracted by the Contractor without prior written notice and consent of the State. The State is entitled to copies of all subcontracts and assignment agreements and shall not be bound by any provisions contained in a subcontract or an assignment agreement to which it is not a party.

13. INDEMNIFICATION. Unless otherwise exempted by law, the Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the State, its officers and employees, from and against any and all claims, liabilities and costs for any personal injury or property damages, patent or copyright infringement, or other claims asserted against the State, its officers or employees, which arise out of (or which may be claimed to arise out of) the acts or omission of the Contractor, or subcontractors, including but not limited to the negligence, reckless or intentional conduct. The State shall not be liable for any costs incurred by the Contractor arising under this paragraph 13. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to constitute a waiver of the sovereign immunity of the State, which immunity is hereby reserved to the State. This covenant in paragraph 13 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

14. INSURANCE.

14.1 The Contractor shall, at its sole expense, obtain and continuously maintain in force, and shall require any subcontractor or assignee to obtain and maintain in force, the following insurance:

14.1.1 commercial general liability insurance against all claims of bodily injury, death or property damage, in amounts of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate or excess; and

14.1.2 special cause of loss coverage form covering all property subject to subparagraph 10.2 herein, in an amount not less than 80% of the whole replacement value of the property.

14.2 The policies described in subparagraph 14.1 herein shall be on policy forms and endorsements approved for use in the State of New Hampshire by the N.H. Department of Insurance, and issued by insurers licensed in the State of New Hampshire.

14.3 The Contractor shall furnish to the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, a certificate(s) of insurance for all insurance required under this Agreement. Contractor shall also furnish to the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, certificate(s) of insurance for all renewal(s) of insurance required under this Agreement no later than ten (10) days prior to the expiration date of each insurance policy. The certificate(s) of insurance and any renewals thereof shall be attached and are incorporated herein by reference.

15. WORKERS' COMPENSATION.

15.1 By signing this agreement, the Contractor agrees, certifies and warrants that the Contractor is in compliance with or exempt from, the requirements of N.H. RSA chapter 281-A ("*Workers' Compensation*").

15.2 To the extent the Contractor is subject to the requirements of N.H. RSA chapter 281-A, Contractor shall maintain, and require any subcontractor or assignee to secure and maintain, payment of Workers' Compensation in connection with activities which the person proposes to undertake pursuant to this Agreement. The Contractor shall furnish the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, proof of Workers' Compensation in the manner described in N.H. RSA chapter 281-A and any applicable renewal(s) thereof, which shall be attached and are incorporated herein by reference. The State shall not be responsible for payment of any Workers' Compensation premiums or for any other claim or benefit for Contractor, or any subcontractor or employee of Contractor, which might arise under applicable State of New Hampshire Workers' Compensation laws in connection with the performance of the Services under this Agreement.

16. NOTICE. Any notice by a party hereto to the other party shall be deemed to have been duly delivered or given at the time of mailing by certified mail, postage prepaid, in a United States Post Office addressed to the parties at the addresses given in blocks 1.2 and 1.4, herein.

17. AMENDMENT. This Agreement may be amended, waived or discharged only by an instrument in writing signed by the parties hereto and only after approval of such amendment, waiver or discharge by the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire unless no such approval is required under the circumstances pursuant to State law, rule or policy.

The terms outlined in the P-37 General Provisions are modified as set forth below:

A.1 Provision 3, Effective Date/Completion of Services, is updated with the following addition:

3.3 The Term may be extended up to Three (3) years(s), ("Extended Term") at the sole option of the State, subject to the parties prior written Agreement on applicable fees for each extended Term, up to but not beyond August 31, 2026 under the same terms and conditions, subject to approval of the Governor and Executive Council.

A.2 Provision 5, Contract Price/Price Limitation/ Payment, is updated with the following addition:

5.5 The State's liability under this Agreement shall be limited to monetary damages not to exceed the contract price pursuant to Paragraph 5.2. The Contractor agrees that it has an adequate remedy at law for any breach of this Agreement by the State and hereby waives any right to specific performance or other equitable remedies against the State. Subject to applicable laws and regulations, in no event shall the State be liable for any consequential, special, indirect, incidental, punitive, or exemplary damages. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to constitute a waiver of the sovereign immunity of the State, which immunity is hereby reserved to the State.

A.3 Provision 8, Event of Default/Remedies, is updated with the following addition:

8.2.5 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the event of Default, terminate the agreement as breached, and procure Services that are the subject of the Contract from another source and Contractor shall be liable for reimbursing the State for the replacement Services, and all administrative costs directly related to the replacement of the Contract and procuring the Services from another source, such as costs of competitive bidding, mailing, advertising, applicable fees, charges or penalties, and staff time costs; all of which shall be subject to the limitations of liability set forth in the Contract.

A.4 Provision 9, Termination, is deleted and replaced with the following:

9. TERMINATION

9.1 Notwithstanding paragraph 8, the State may, at its sole discretion, and with written notice, terminate the Agreement for any reason, in whole or in part. In the event of such termination, the Contractor shall immediately stop all work hereunder and shall immediately cause any and all of its suppliers and subcontractors to cease work. Contractor shall not be paid for any work performed or costs incurred which reasonably could have been avoided.

9.2 Termination Procedure

9.2.1 Upon termination of the Contract, the State, in addition to any other rights provided in the Contract, may require Contractor to deliver to the State any property, including without limitation, Software and Written Deliverables, for such part of the Contract as has been terminated.

9.2.2 After receipt of a notice of termination, and except as otherwise directed by the State, Contractor shall:

- a. Stop work under the Contract on the date, and to the extent specified, in the notice;
- b. - f. Implement an orderly return of State data in a CSV or another mutually agreeable format at a time agreed to by the parties;
- g. Securely dispose/destroy of all requested data in all of its forms, such as disk, CD / DVD, backup tape and paper, when requested by the State. Data shall be permanently deleted and shall not be recoverable, according to National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST)-Special Publication (SP) 800-88 approved methods. Certificates of destruction shall be provided to the State; and

the orderly transfer of such Services to the State or its designees ("Transition Services").

9.2.4 This covenant in paragraph 9 shall survive the termination of this Contract.

A.5 Provision 10, Data/Access/Confidentiality/Preservation, is updated with the following addition:

10.4 In performing its obligations under this Agreement, Contractor may gain access to Confidential Information of the State. Confidential Information includes any and all information owned or managed by the State of NH - created, received from or on behalf of any Agency of the State or accessed in the course of performing contracted Services - of which collection, disclosure, protection, and disposition is governed by state or federal law or regulation. This information includes, but is not limited to Protected Health Information (PHI), Personally Identifiable Information (PII), Personal Financial Information (PFI), Federal Tax Information (FTI), Social Security Numbers (SSN), Payment Card Industry (PCI), and or other sensitive and Confidential Information. The Contractor shall not use the Confidential Information developed or obtained during the performance of, or acquired, or developed by reason of the Agreement, except as directly connected to and necessary for the performance of the Agreement. Contractor shall maintain the confidentiality of and protect from unauthorized use, disclosure, publication, and reproduction (collectively "release"), all Confidential Information.

10.5 Subject to applicable federal or State laws and regulations, Confidential Information shall not include information which:

- a. shall have otherwise become publicly available other than as a result of disclosure by the receiving Party in breach hereof;
- b. was disclosed to the receiving Party on a non-confidential basis from a source other than the disclosing Party, which the receiving Party believes is not prohibited from disclosing such information as a result of an obligation in favor of the disclosing Party;
- c. is developed by the receiving Party independently of, or was known by the receiving Party prior to, any disclosure of such information made by the disclosing Party; or
- d. is disclosed with the written consent of the disclosing Party.

10.6 A receiving Party also may disclose the disclosing Party's Confidential Information to the extent required by an order of a court of competent jurisdiction. Any disclosure of the Confidential Information shall require the prior written approval of the State. Contractor shall immediately notify the State if any request, subpoena or other legal process is served upon Contractor regarding the Confidential Information, and

Contractor shall cooperate with the State in any effort the State undertakes to contest the request, subpoena or other legal process, at no additional cost to the State.

10.7 Contractor Confidential Information. Contractor shall clearly identify in writing all information it claims to be confidential or proprietary upon providing such information to the State. For the purposes of complying with its legal obligations, the State is under no obligation to accept the Contractor's designation of material as confidential. Contractor acknowledges that the State is subject to State and federal laws governing disclosure of information including, but not limited to, RSA Chapter 91-A. In the event the State receives a request for the information identified by Contractor as confidential, the State shall notify Contractor and specify the date the State will be releasing the requested information. At the request of the State, Contractor shall cooperate and assist the State with the collection and review of Contractor's information, at no additional expense to the State. Any effort to prohibit or enjoin the release of the information shall be Contractor's sole responsibility and at Contractor's sole expense. If Contractor fails to obtain a court order enjoining the disclosure, the State shall release the information on the date specified in the State's notice to Contractor, without any liability to the State.

10.8 This covenant in paragraph 10 shall survive the termination of this Contract.

A.6 Provision 12, Assignment/Delegation/Subcontracts, is updated with the following addition:

12.3 In the event that Contractor should change ownership for any reason whatsoever that results in a change of control of the Contractor, the State shall have the option of:

- a. continuing under the Agreement with Contractor, its successors or assigns for the full remaining Term of the Agreement or for such period of time as determined necessary by the State;
- b. immediately terminate the Agreement without liability to or further compensation owed to Contractor, its successors or assigns.

A.7 The following Provisions are added and made part of the P37:

- 4) Cross reference all discovered attributes against any proprietary database of attackers used in prior attacks or linked to known criminal groups in Dark Web Marketplaces, Forums, or Scrapes.
- 5) Perform an engineering review of the attack vector for known patterns, attribution, or links to countries or advanced persistent threat groups (APT).
- 6) Determine (by reverse engineering, signature analysis, and Internet research) whether the malware variant is linked to known attackers or groups or contains code that could indicate an attacker's geographical location or native language.
- 7) Review language, translations, English proficiency, Time zone, IP addresses, and geolocation indicators to try to determine geographical location and/or whether an attacker is deliberately masking their identity or pretending to come from a different location, Language, or country.
- 8) Complete liaising on "no-names" basis with law enforcement to determine if similar attacks/ransom demands have been linked to terrorist/proscribed groups.

B. Gemini Digital Currency Transactions

- 1) With approval from the State CISO or CIO, ATOM will process requested digital currency transfer in a normal negotiation where ATOM will accept wire transfer of funds from the State of New Hampshire Department of Information Technology and process those funds through Gemini for transfer to a threat actor as directed by the State of New Hampshire Department of Information Technology. ATOM will accept responsibility for transferring funds up to \$2,500,000.00 USD.
- 2) In an emergency context, such as when a deal can be made with a threat actor for a lower price if funds can be transferred quickly, or if negotiations require swift payment to successfully complete, Contractor will make emergency transfers up to \$50,000.00 USD within 12 hours, or up to \$100,000.00 USD in 24 hours. Emergency funds may be requested to pay a partial or full payment of ransom request pending the successful completion of OFAC Due Diligence. The State of New Hampshire Department of Information Technology may only request one

emergency payment at a time and may not request a second emergency request unless the previous funding is fully reimbursed.

Hours under this retainer not used for Negotiations or Fast Currency Fund actions may be used for onsite and remote emergency remediation services, which include incident command, law enforcement coordination, engineering quarantine, isolation, sandbox testing, forensic collection, threat actor attribution, attack vector identification, and inoculation of the environment. All onsite and remote services and capabilities will be at the disposal of the State of New Hampshire Department of Information Technology. Additionally, unused hours may be added to the Technical Auditing Services described below.

The Contractor shall also provide 100 hours of technical auditing services in an on-demand capacity and as coordinated with the State Chief Information Security Officer. Contractor shall provide technical auditing services in four parts:

- a) **ENGINEERING TESTING** – Contractor shall use vulnerability assessments and penetration testing techniques. Technical auditing occurs at all levels of the infrastructure, from perimeter, to application, to network (all layers), design, architecture, and use of cryptography. Technical auditing is often aided by tools for vulnerability analysis, penetration testing, and static scanning (Veracode).
- b) **COMPLIANCE AUDITING** – Contractor shall perform compliance auditing by performing compliance gap analysis for cybersecurity and regulatory frameworks such as The Center for Internet Security Version 8, The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR/GDPR EU), HIPAA, HITRUST, ISO 27001, FERPA, COPPA, PIPEDA, and numerous state and federal regulations to name a few.
- c) **PRIVACY AUDITING** – Contractor shall perform privacy audits for governance, collection, and processing of personal information.
- d) **REMIEDIATIONS** – Contractor shall work with DoIT to guide remediation activity, perform the remediation for you at your request, or align you with subject matter experts that will be well versed in taking care of a specific issue.

4. DELIVERABLE REVIEW AND ACCEPTANCE

After receiving such Certification from the Contractor, the State will Review the Deliverable to determine whether it meets the requirements outlined in this Exhibit. 4.4 Conditional and Unconditional Acceptance

By accepting a Deliverable, the State reserves the right to reject any and all Deliverables in the event the State detects any Deficiency in the System, in whole or in part, through completion of all Acceptance Testing, including but not limited to, Software/System Acceptance Testing, and any extensions thereof.

5. CHANGE ORDER

The State may make changes, revisions, or request enhancements to the Scope of Work at any time by written Change Order. 9. DATA PROTECTION

Protection of personal privacy and data shall be an integral part of the business activities of the Contractor to ensure there is no inappropriate or unauthorized use of State information at any time. To this end, the Contractor shall safeguard the confidentiality, integrity and availability of State information and comply with the following conditions:

- a. fielding media inquiries and seeking external expertise as mutually agreed upon, defined by law or contained in the Contract. Discussing security incidents with the State should be handled on an urgent as-needed basis, as part of the Contractor communication and mitigation processes as mutually agreed upon, defined by law or contained in the contract.

- b. Security Incident Reporting Requirements: the Contractor shall report a security incident to the State identified contact immediately if it reasonably believes there has been a security incident.
- c. Breach Reporting Requirements: If the Contractor has actual knowledge of a confirmed data breach that affects the security of any State content that is subject to applicable data breach notification law, the Contractor shall (1) promptly notify the appropriate State identified contact within 24 hours or sooner, unless shorter time is required by applicable law, and (2) take commercially reasonable measures to address the data breach in a timely manner.

10. Breach Responsibilities
