REQUESTED ACTION

Pursuant to the provisions of RSA 14:30-a, VI authorize the Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) to amend Fiscal Item FIS 22-195, approved by the Fiscal Committee on May 20, 2022 and approved by Governor and Council on June 1, 2022, Item #74 as amended by FIS 22-330, approved by the Fiscal Committee by October 14, 2022 and approved by Governor and Council on October 19, 2022, Item #70 and as extended by Fiscal Committee Item FIS #23-166 approved on May 19, 2023, and Governor and Council Item #160 approved on May 31, 2023 and as extended by Fiscal Committee Item FIS#24-182 approved on May 17, 2024 and Governor and Council Item #154 approved on May 15, 2024 by reallocating funds in the amount of \$1,721,324 between class lines, effective upon Fiscal Committee and Governor & Council approval through June 30, 2025. 100% Federal Funds.

EXPLANATION

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021, is a \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill passed by the 117th United States Congress and signed into law by President Biden on March 11, 2021, to expedite the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and the resultant recession. The Act defines eligible uses of the state and local funding, including responding to public health emergency, responding to workers performing essential work during the COVID -19 emergency, providing revenue relief to states and making investments in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure.

NHDES has been awarded a total of \$35,000,000 to fund the rehabilitation of state and municipally owned dams to meet current dam safety standards. Of the \$35 million in federal funds awarded, \$29.2 million was allocated for

the rehabilitation of state-owned dams, and \$5.8 million was allocated for grants to municipalities for the rehabilitation of municipally owned high hazard dams. The rehabilitation of state-owned dams is largely performed on a force account basis by the NHDES Dam Bureau Engineering and Construction Section staff, consisting of three civil engineers, including the Section Supervisor, and two land surveyors who design and oversee the projects, as well as a nine-person construction crew that performs the actual construction. Some work is also performed on a contract basis with engineering consultants and construction contractors. To support the existing NHDES Dam Bureau staff, four additional full-time temporary positions were created to accomplish the rehabilitation work.

NHDES original personnel costs were budgeted through the end of FY2024. Given additional guidance from the US Treasury Department, personnel costs have been budgeted through the end of the ARPA Program. NHDES is requesting the transfer of funds from different classes to cover these costs to best use the available appropriation.

NHDES is requesting to transfer funds as shown below:

- Class 018 To cover the cost for overtime for personnel.
- Class 023 To cover costs for heat, electricity, and water.
- Class 027 To cover costs for Department of Information Technology services.
- Class 028 To cover costs for state office building rent and related services.
- Class 038 To cover the costs for technology software.
- Class 040 To cover the program share of statewide indirect costs.
- Class 042 To cover the program share of additional fringe benefit costs.
- Class 050 The additional amount of \$369,396 will not be used for new positions. Employee support from existing DES organizational units will be utilized to administer this program. These funds will be used to supplant funding of the following full-time positions. FAQ 48 from US Treasury states that payroll and benefits of employees managing new grant programs established with FRF is an allowable use. Funding in the amount of \$369,396 which is budgeted for the current positions, will either be lapsed or closed to control resulting in a net zero increase in budgeted funds.



REQUESTED ACTION

Pursuant to RSA 14:30-a, VI and RSA 124:15, the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) is seeking approval on behalf of State Agencies to amend the accept and expend of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) State Fiscal Recovery Funds (SFRF) requests by extending the end date for funding, new positions, and/or new Class 046-Consultants, created in relation to the acceptance of ARPA SFRF funds, from June 30, 2023 to June 30, 2024, effective upon approval of the Fiscal Committee and the Governor and Executive Council. 100% Federal Funds.

EXPLANATION

The Department of Administrative Services is seeking approval, on behalf of the State Agencies listed in Attachment A, to extend the effective date of the attached items from June 30, 2023 to June 30, 2024. This extension is allowable under the "procedural rules amendment" approved at the previous Fiscal Committee meeting on April 21, 2023. All items included in the attachment have been previously submitted by the respective state agency responsible for the program and approved by both the Fiscal Committee and Governor and Executive Council. In addition, the Governor's Office of Emergency Relief and Recovery (GOFERR) has reviewed the attachment and concurs with the extensions requested.

While all ARPA SFRF must be obligated by December 31, 2024, and expended by December 31, 2026, this request only serves to authorize agencies' program balances that are unspent as of June 30, 2023, as well as positions and consultants created pursuant to RSA 124:15, to carry forward into FY24 and reauthorize projects or programs that were already intended to continue utilizing authorized ARPA SFRF into the next biennium. This will also grant agencies in coordination with GOFERR time to further evaluate projects and programs as the ARPA SFRF obligation deadline approaches in order to

ensure any funds that may need to be reallocated to other uses have sufficient time to do so. Any request to reallocate an existing budget or repurpose funds for new or existing projects will require future Fiscal Committee and Governor and Council approvals and are not contemplated in this item.

If this item is not timely approved, the State would need to issue layoff notices to employees hired into these federally funded positions, created under the original ARPA request, agencies would halt work on time-sensitive projects or payments on existing contracts, and ongoing programs would be unable to issue or follow through on awards. Further, each agency would then need to submit a retroactive request to July 1, 2023 for approval to reauthorize the positions and funding; however, the retroactive requests would not eliminate the need to issue layoff notices in June 2023.

Typically, agencies budget for known federal grants in the upcoming biennial budget; however, the budget guidance issued in August 2022 instructed Agencies to exclude all COVID-related funding from their FY24-FY25 budget submissions in order to maintain the authorization methodology, compliance protocols, and audit trail that had become standard for use and oversight of ARPA SFRF. Moreover, although the funding is authorized by the federal government beyond June 30, 2023, including this one-time funding would have erroneously inflated the FY24-FY25 State budget.

In the event that Federal Funds are no longer available, General Funds will not be requested to support these programs. The Department of Administrative Services seeks approval of this request.





The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021, is a \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill passed by the 117th United States Congress and signed into law by President Biden on March 11, 2021, to expedite the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and the resultant recession. The Act defines eligible uses of the state and local funding, including responding to public health emergency, responding to workers performing essential work during the COVID -19 emergency, providing revenue relief to states and making investments in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure.

Of the \$35 million in federal funds awarded, \$30 million was to be allocated for the rehabilitation of state-owned dams, and \$5 million was to be allocated for grants to municipalities for the rehabilitation of




municipally owned high hazard dams. To support the existing NHDES Dam Bureau staff in the rehabilitation of state-owned dams, four additional full-time temporary positions were created to accomplish rehabilitation work within the deadlines established in ARPA, under which the funds for all work must be obligated by December 31, 2024, and fully expended by December 31, 2026. One of the four positions, an Environmentalist IV, has been hired and tasked with not only assuming responsibility for all the environmental permitting and compliance associated with the rehabilitation projects on state-owned dams, but is also tasked with completing and confirming wetland delineation and obtaining bathymetric data at these state-owned dam sites. Historically, after performing a wetland delineation or bathymetric survey, all data was captured using conventional survey techniques which required multiple survey staff and resources to complete. Now, with the advent of GPS technology, wetland and bathymetric data can be more accurately captured real-time by one individual completing the tasks. NHDES is requesting the transfer of \$40,000 from Class 102 Contracts for Program Services to Class 030 Equipment for the purchase of a GPS system capable of capturing the survey-grade data, which will save the NHDES Dam Bureau resources and time.

The other additional full-time temporary positions in the Engineering and Construction Section also require the use of CAD engineering software to oversee work performed with engineering consultants and construction contractors. The price of this software has increased significantly since the original request, and therefore NHDES is requesting the transfer of \$15,000 from Class 102 Contracts for Program Services to Class 038 Technology Software to cover the price increases for the software. Without this software, the staff will be limited in their ability to design and assist on ARPA projects.

The \$5 million in ARPA funds were set aside for grants to municipalities to assist with repair and reconstruction of locally owned high hazard dams. NHDES has received nine (9) applications for grants from municipalities totaling \$5,850,000. NHDES is requesting the transfer of \$850,000 from Class 102 Contracts for Program Services to Class 072 Grants in order to fully fund each project. This transfer will help the municipalities in their efforts to fully complete their projects as outlined in the applications.



The rehabilitation of state-owned dams is largely performed on a force account basis by the NHDES Dam Bureau Engineering and Construction Section staff, consisting of three civil engineers, including the Section Supervisor, and two land surveyors who design and oversee the projects, as well as a nine-person construction crew that performs the actual construction. Some work is also performed on a contract basis

with engineering consultants and construction contractors, overseen by Engineering and Construction Section engineers. With its current staffing, the Section has the capacity to perform only approximately \$4 million of dam rehabilitation projects on a force account basis per biennium; and, with the help of other Dam Bureau staff, to oversee up to another \$4 million in contract design and construction work per biennium. With this award, the Engineering and Construction Section will be responsible for executing \$30 million in rehabilitation of state-owned dams in four and a half years, which is four times the current capacity of the Section. Additional full-time temporary positions are needed in the Engineering and Construction Section to accomplish this work within the deadlines established in ARPA, under which the funds for all work must be obligated by December 31, 2024, and fully expended by December 31, 2026.

In addition, with the award, the NHDES Dam Bureau will establish and administer an entirely new grant program in the amount of \$5 million to assist with the rehabilitation of municipally owned dams.

NHDES is requesting to budget these funds as shown below:


- **Two Civil Engineer V (LG 30, \$64,662 - \$92,891)** to provide for the procurement and management of contracts for civil engineering design services, as well as construction, and oversight of the performance of contracted work for state-owned dams.
- **Environmentalist IV (LG 27, \$56,218 - \$80,106)** to assume responsibility for all the environmental permitting and compliance associated with the additional rehabilitation projects on state owned dams, including wetland permits, water quality certificates and Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plans, and others as required by Section 404 of the Clean Water Act, NH RSA 482-A, the National Environmental Policy Act and the Historic Preservation Act. The position will be responsible for conducting site investigations and all public outreach requirements associated with environmental impacts necessary to ensure that the projects are completed in a manner that benefits all stakeholders.

- **Environmental Program Manager (LG 27, \$56,218 - \$80,106)** to establish the new grant program to fund the rehabilitation of municipally owned dams and provide project management and administration of the funds granted to the communities for the planning, design and construction of dam repair or removal projects, including soliciting and processing project applications, funding agreements, and disbursements. As the primary point of contact for all Dam Safety permitting, this position will be integral in providing a preliminary review of all technical and supporting data to ensure resources needed to review the permit applications are used in the most efficient manner to achieve the goal of obligating all funds by December 31, 2024, and fully expending the funds by December 31, 2026.
2. ***Explain the Nature, Need, and Duration of the Program:*** The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 is providing funds to states through the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund to assist states with the economic impacts of the pandemic. To this end, this portion of those funds is earmarked for state owned dam rehabilitations and grants to municipalities for dam rehabilitations.
 3. ***What is the Relationship to Existing Programs?***
The ARPA funds will increase by a factor of four the existing appropriations per biennium for the rehabilitation of state-owned dams, and will establish a new temporary grant program for the rehabilitation of municipally owned dams.
 4. ***Has a Substantially Similar Program been Requested of the Legislature and Denied?*** No.
 5. ***Why was this Program and Its Funding Not Included in the Operating Budget?*** The federal grant funds were not available at the time the department created its FY22/23 Operating budget request. Management of the overall ARPA funds is being coordinated through GOEFFR.
 6. ***Can any Portion of the Funds Be Utilized if Either, None, or Only Part of the Positions are Authorized?*** No, the contracts, and grant portions of the requested funding could not be effectively awarded without approval of the positions. Current staff resources would preclude timely review and processing of work scope authorizations, reports, engineering plans and grant applications. Current staffing is not sufficient to allow timely execution of the work required under the federal requirements.
 7. ***What is the Estimate of the Amount of Funding Required to Continue the Positions in Future Years?***
It is anticipated that the positions are likely to continue until the ARPA funding expires on December 31, 2026. The estimated cost of these positions in FY 24/25 is \$455,931.
