REQUESTED ACTION

Pursuant to RSA 14:30-a, VI, authorize the Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery (GOFERR), on behalf of various state agencies, to accept and expend American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) State Fiscal Recovery Funds (SFRF) in an amount totaling \$13,774,855 as outlined further below, effective upon Fiscal Committee and Governor and Executive Council approval through June 30, 2025.
100% Federal Funds.

- A. On behalf of the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), Office of the Commissioner, accept and expend \$7,738,973 to support capital investments in New Hampshire's behavioral health system. This is an allowable use of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) State Fiscal Recovery Funds (SFRF) under Section 602(c)(1)(A) to respond to the public health emergency or its negative economic impacts and Section 602(c)(1)(C) for provision of government services to the extent of reduction in revenue.

Funds are to be budgeted in 05-95-94-940010-24650000^[1] Health and Social Services, Dept of Health and Human Services, HHS: New Hampshire Hospital, ARPA DHHS Fiscal Recovery Fund, as follows:

EXPLANATION

Funds for this item are made available through ARPA SFRF funding that has been reallocated from programs that did not expend their entire award amount.

A. Department of Health and Human Services

Project #1 - Transitional Housing

The Department seeks approval to accept approximately \$2 million to support the establishment of a new eight-bed therapeutic transitional housing program. The therapeutic program would support participants through transitions of care and serve as an alternative to and diversion from inpatient settings and a bridge to independent living following an inpatient stay or period of homelessness.

Approval of this request will support the Department's commitment to expanding residential treatment options for individuals with mental health conditions. The Department's efforts through Mission Zero, an initiative to eliminate emergency department psychiatric boarding, have highlighted the need to increase capacity of specialized residences to provide tailored supports and treatment to adults with mental health conditions. Transitional residential programs that provide integrated behavioral health treatment, daily living skills development, vocational support and community integration services are needed to facilitate recovery. Adding these critical services would lessen the burden placed on hospitals and shelters as a safety net and provide cost-effective support to enhance self-sufficiency and independence.

The Department plans to use the funding to enter into an agreement with NFI North, Inc. for the purpose of purchasing and outfitting one new property. The property is anticipated to consist of eight single bedrooms within a home-like setting. The property will meet life safety and ADA code requirements. NFI North, Inc. is a trusted partner with a proven record of establishing high quality residential programs.

Project #2 – Children’s Center of Excellence

The Department requests to accept funding for capital investments to support and enhance services provided at the Children’s Center of Excellence on the Hampstead campus in the amount of \$5,738,973.

First, the Department seeks to use approximately \$3 million to support the renovation of the psychiatric residential treatment facility at Hampstead Hospital and Residential Treatment Facility (HHRTF). The PRTF is an intensive mental health treatment facility on the Children’s Center of Excellence campus at Hampstead and is NH’s only PRTF.

The Department would use the funding to engage an architect and contracting firm to make several crucial improvements to better fulfill the mission of serving 12 youth (rather than the average census of 6 it currently can accommodate). This funding will allow for:

- A more modern, open design can incorporate larger therapeutic spaces that can support various types of treatment modalities.
- Make the overall HHRTF operation more financially sustainable as revenue is not currently being maximized due to space and programming challenges associated with the current design.
- An expansion of the unit’s footprint to an industry standard square footage per youth, which will improve youth behaviors and staff satisfaction.
- Provide for more common space to make the environment more behaviorally stable and trauma-informed, accommodating therapeutic interventions and group activities.
- Include more single bedrooms (rather than double) to better accommodate youth with challenging behaviors and reduce violent incidents.
- Shift to more safely accommodate youth of different genders, or with other issues between youth that require greater separation of sleeping spaces.
- Allow for life skill development spaces, such as a learning kitchen area, laundry machines, and other features to help youth build life skills for their return to the community.

Approval of this request will allow more NH youth in need of high-quality, intensive behavioral health services to receive such services close to their home community and natural supports, reducing the number who must wait to access such services—or access them outside of the State/region.

Second, the Department is requesting to accept \$2,738,973 to support the construction of a therapeutically-oriented treatment facility for youth as required by Chapter 2, Laws of 2023. The Department has been working with the Department of Administrative Services, Division of Public Works Design and Construction (DPW), to design the new youth development facility. Through that work, the Department

and DPW engaged in aggressive space-cutting measures to reduce costs while still ensuring safety and sufficient space for a therapeutic environment. On August 8, 2024, DPW posted a request for a Request for Bids (RFB) for construction of the new facility. This bid contained fifteen (15) Alternate Bid Items (Alternates). Alternates are not included in the Base Bid and, therefore, not used to determine the low bid. Once the low bid is established, the Department may add or deduct scope as described in the Alternates and per the Alternate bid prices provided by the low bidder. If this request is approved, then the Department will have funding sufficient to support several of the Alternates to support the Department's larger strategic behavioral health system efforts.

Funds are to be budgeted as follows:

Class 102 – Contracts for Program Services will be used to support the behavioral health system capital investments described above.

In the event that Federal Funds become no longer available, General Funds will not be requested to support this program.

B. Department of Corrections

This request provides additional funds for an ongoing project for the repair and replacement of air handlers and ductwork at the State Prison for Men. This project was first approved by Fiscal Committee on June 8, 2021, item FIS 21-137 and Governor and Council on June 16, 2021 item #75. The systems are currently being repaired and rebuilt due to the age of the systems, dating back to 1983, and ductwork rusting through to the point of collapsing. Each housing unit is approximately 19,500 square feet.

Due to COVID-19, ARPA SFRF has funded many HVAC related projects across the country, driving up costs and impacting supply chains. Unprecedented price escalations have resulted since the initial estimates were completed for this project. This additional funding will allow for induct cooling to be installed in staff areas, electric heaters to be installed in machinal areas, allowing the housing unit to no longer have steam in the buildings, and duct cleaning. As construction on this project has progressed and ductwork has been removed for replacement, issues have been discovered which were not known at the project's inception, including:

- Several sections of duct located in hidden chase ways were found to be deteriorated or missing. Most of the project contingency was utilized to replace this ductwork.
- The spaces where the plenums were originally designed to be installed were found to be too small for the installer to access to complete the work. A minor design change was made to move the plenums and associated ductwork to alternative accessible locations. These new locations are influenced by outdoor conditions, so insulation must now be added to protect the duct in these areas.
- The remaining ducting that is not being replaced as part of this project was found to have a build-up of dust and debris inside which could travel through the duct systems and be distributed into the air, as well as restrict air flow to and from the air handlers, increasing the risk of failure of the air handlers. A professional duct cleaning company is needed to thoroughly clean the duct and ensure all the debris is removed.

In addition, the following items that were included in the original project now lack funding to complete due to the unexpected expense to replace the additional ducting described above:

- Air conditioning equipment was procured that will provide cooling in staff areas, which become unbearably hot in the summer months. However, this project now lacks the funds needed to install this equipment.
- One of the goals of this project is to eliminate steam heat from the Medium Custody North and South housing units, which would create energy efficiency and cost savings. The mechanical spaces in these buildings have been heated via residual heat coming from the steam pipes, which prevents the plumbing pipes in the mechanical spaces from freezing in the winter. Small electric heaters were planned to be installed in the mechanical spaces to provide heat once the steam was eliminated. However, this item was removed from the project due to a lack of funds. As a result, the steam to these buildings will need to remain on in the winter to heat the mechanical spaces, which is an ongoing annual cost and energy usage.

Funds are to be budgeted as follows:

Class 103 - Contracts for Operation Services to install new air handlers and duct work.

In the event that Federal Funds become no longer available, General Funds will not be requested to support this program.

C. Department of Environmental Services

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021, is a \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill passed by the 117th United States Congress and signed into law by President Biden on March 11, 2021, to expedite the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and the resultant recession. The Act defines eligible uses of the state and local funding, including responding to public health emergency, responding to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 emergency, providing revenue relief to states and making investments in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure.

NHDES has been awarded \$500,000 in ARPA funds to support cyanobacteria mitigation efforts to assist eligible municipalities to reduce the number of chronic and extended cyanobacteria blooms that are a threat to the long-term health and recreational values of state waterbodies.

Funds are to be budgeted as follows:

Class 072 – Grants Federal to cover grants for support in cyanobacteria mitigation efforts.

D. Department of Administrative Services

The requested funds will be used for two (2) deferred maintenance projects both of which have been started but are in need of additional funding for the renovations.

- The first project is to continue the work for a much-needed bathroom renovation project at the State House. Several years ago, the General Court of New Hampshire (GCNH) in conjunction with the Department of Public Works (DPW), contracted with an engineering firm to develop a design plan for bathroom renovations at the State House to make them ADA/building code compliant. The design was completed but the project was never started because funding was not available. An updated design was recently completed, and the first construction phase of the project received ARPA funding in May 2024 (FIS 24 183) and work has begun. The initial funding allowed for one stack of bathrooms to be renovated and this request, for \$1,030,000, will allow for all remaining bathrooms to be renovated.
- The second project is for additional funding for the State House Annex Building renovation. Partial funding has been appropriated over the last several years with capital funds (Chapter 146:1, II, B, 4, Laws of 2019 and Chapter 107:1, I, D, 11, Laws of 2021), FY 22-23 HB2 funding, and most recently in FY23 with additional ARPA funds. The current contract is for the partial renovation of the existing office building, including the demolition and installation of new mechanical, plumbing and electrical systems, bathroom renovations, partitions, doors, and finishes. Renovations will be made to all four floors and the basement in the area of the building facing Capitol Street (core area), as well as the West wing of the fourth floor. The work also includes abatement of hazardous materials found in the areas to be renovated. Future phases will complete the renovation of the building, including the remaining wings of the basement and the first through fourth floors. This request for \$2,420,000 will allow renovations to continue for the east and west wings of one floor in the building.

Funds are budgeted as follows:

Class 048 - Contract Repairs: Bldg. Grounds - Includes contractual costs of maintenance projects by contracted vendors. Services provided may include, but are not limited to, plumbing, electrical, flooring work, and other services associated with this project.

In the event that Federal Funds become no longer available, additional General or Capital Funds may be requested to support this.

E. Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery

This project would result in a one-time investment in the replacement of the roof at Stafford County Courthouse. Due to several drainage, age, underlayment, and patch failure issues, the roof is currently leaking during rainstorms or heavy snow. Most sections of the roof were in "failed" condition per a report issued June 2024. Some of the staff who work in the building have water running into their offices during rainstorms.
