### REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Safety, Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM) to enter into a grant agreement with the Town of Waterville Valley (154573-B001), Box 500, Waterville Valley, NH 03223, in an amount not to exceed \$8,399.70 to update their Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP). Effective upon Governor and Council approval through September 23, 2027. **100% Federal Funds.**

### EXPLANATION

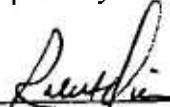
Governor and Council approval is being sought because the amount of previous payments by the Department of Safety to the Town of Waterville Valley, plus the amount of this grant yields a cumulative amount that is over the Departments' approved threshold.

The purpose of this grant is for the Town of Waterville Valley to update their HMP. The grant listed above is funded by the Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant program, which was awarded to the Department of Safety, HSEM, from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). BRIC provides funding to sub-recipients for cost-effective hazard mitigation activities that complement a comprehensive mitigation program. FEMA provides BRIC funds to states that, in turn, provide sub-grants or contracts for a variety of mitigation activities, such as planning, and the implementation of projects identified through the evaluation of natural hazards.

BRIC is 75% Federally funded by FEMA with a 25% match requirement supplied by the sub-recipient. The sub-recipient acknowledges their match obligation as part of Exhibits B and C to their grant agreement.

In the event that BRIC funds are no longer available, General Funds and/or Highway Funds will not be requested to support this program.

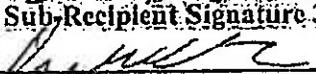
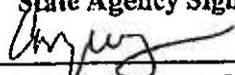

**2. SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED.** The State of New Hampshire, acting through the agency identified in block 1.1 ("State"), engages contractor identified in block 1.3 ("Contractor") to perform, and the Contractor shall perform, the work or sale of goods, or both, identified and more particularly

described in the attached EXHIBIT B which is incorporated herein by reference ("Services").

**3. EFFECTIVE DATE/COMPLETION OF SERVICES.**

3.1 Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, and subject to the approval of the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire, if applicable, this Agreement, and all obligations of the parties hereunder, shall become effective on the date the Governor and Executive Council approve this Agreement as indicated in block 1.17, unless no such approval is required, in which case the Agreement shall become effective on the date the Agreement is signed by the State Agency as shown in block 1.13 ("Effective Date").

3.2 If the Contractor commences the Services prior to the Effective Date, all Services performed by the Contractor prior to the Effective Date shall be performed at the sole risk of the Contractor, and in the event that this Agreement does not become effective, the State shall have no liability to the Contractor, including without limitation, any obligation to pay the Contractor for any costs incurred or Services performed. Contractor must complete all Services by the Completion Date specified in block 1.7.

**4. CONDITIONAL NATURE OF AGREEMENT.**

Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, all obligations of the State hereunder, including, without limitation, the continuance of payments hereunder, are contingent upon the availability and continued appropriation of funds affected by any state or federal legislative or executive action that reduces, eliminates or otherwise modifies the appropriation or availability of funding for this Agreement and the Scope for Services provided in EXHIBIT B, in whole or in part. In no event shall the State be liable for any payments hereunder in excess of such available appropriated funds. In the event of a reduction or termination of appropriated funds, the State shall have the right to withhold payment until such funds become available, if ever, and shall have the right to reduce or terminate the Services under this Agreement immediately upon giving the Contractor notice of such reduction or termination. The State shall not be required to transfer funds from any other account or source to the Account identified in block 1.6 in the event funds in that Account are reduced or unavailable.

**5. CONTRACT PRICE/PRICE LIMITATION/PAYMENT.**

5.1 The contract price, method of payment, and terms of payment are identified and more particularly described in EXHIBIT C which is incorporated herein by reference.

5.2 The payment by the State of the contract price shall be the only and the complete reimbursement to the Contractor for all expenses, of whatever nature incurred by the Contractor in the performance hereof, and shall be the only and the complete compensation to the Contractor for the Services. The State shall have no liability to the Contractor other than the contract price.

5.3 The State reserves the right to offset from any amounts otherwise payable to the Contractor under this Agreement those liquidated amounts required or permitted by N.H. RSA 80:7 through RSA 80:7-c or any other provision of law.

5.4 Notwithstanding any provision in this Agreement to the contrary, and notwithstanding unexpected circumstances, in no event shall the total of all payments authorized, or actually made hereunder, exceed the Price Limitation set forth in block 1.8.

**6. COMPLIANCE BY CONTRACTOR WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS/ EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.**

6.1 In connection with the performance of the Services, the Contractor shall comply with all applicable statutes, laws, regulations, and orders of federal, state, county or municipal authorities which impose any obligation or duty upon the Contractor, including, but not limited to, civil rights and equal employment opportunity laws. In addition, if this Agreement is funded in any part by monies of the United States, the Contractor shall comply with all federal executive orders, rules, regulations and statutes, and with any rules, regulations and guidelines as the State or the United States issue to implement these regulations. The Contractor shall also comply with all applicable intellectual property laws.

6.2 During the term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall not discriminate against employees or applicants for employment because of race, color, religion, creed, age, sex, handicap, sexual orientation, or national origin and will take affirmative action to prevent such discrimination.

6.3. The Contractor agrees to permit the State or United States access to any of the Contractor's books, records and accounts for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with all rules, regulations and orders, and the covenants, terms and conditions of this Agreement.

**7. PERSONNEL.**

7.1 The Contractor shall at its own expense provide all personnel necessary to perform the Services. The Contractor warrants that all personnel engaged in the Services shall be qualified to perform the Services, and shall be properly licensed and otherwise authorized to do so under all applicable laws.

7.2 Unless otherwise authorized in writing, during the term of this Agreement, and for a period of six (6) months after the Completion Date in block 1.7, the Contractor shall not hire, and shall not permit any subcontractor or other person, firm or corporation with whom it is engaged in a combined effort to perform the Services to hire, any person who is a State employee or official, who is materially involved in the procurement, administration or performance of this Agreement. This provision shall survive termination of this Agreement.

7.3 The Contracting Officer specified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, shall be the State's representative. In the event of any dispute concerning the interpretation of this Agreement, the Contracting Officer's decision shall be final for the State.

**8. EVENT OF DEFAULT/REMEDIES.**

8.1 Any one or more of the following acts or omissions of the Contractor shall constitute an event of default hereunder ("Event of Default"):

8.1.1 failure to perform the Services satisfactorily or on schedule;

8.1.2 failure to submit any report required hereunder; and/or

8.1.3 failure to perform any other covenant, term or condition of this Agreement.

8.2 Upon the occurrence of any Event of Default, the State may take any one, or more, or all, of the following actions:

8.2.1 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and requiring it to be remedied within, in the absence of a greater or lesser specification of time, thirty (30) days from the date of the notice; and if the Event of Default is not timely cured, terminate this Agreement, effective two (2) days after giving the Contractor notice of termination;

8.2.2 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and suspending all payments to be made under this Agreement and ordering that the portion of the contract price which would otherwise accrue to the Contractor during the period from the date of such notice until such time as the State determines that the Contractor has cured the Event of Default shall never be paid to the Contractor;

8.2.3 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default and set off against any other obligations the State may owe to the Contractor any damages the State suffers by reason of any Event of Default; and/or

8.2.4 give the Contractor a written notice specifying the Event of Default, treat the Agreement as breached, terminate the Agreement and pursue any of its remedies at law or in equity, or both.

8.3. No failure by the State to enforce any provisions hereof after any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of its rights with regard to that Event of Default, or any subsequent Event of Default. No express failure to enforce any Event of Default shall be deemed a waiver of the right of the State to enforce each and all of the provisions hereof upon any further or other Event of Default on the part of the Contractor.

#### 9. TERMINATION.

9.1 Notwithstanding paragraph 8, the State may, at its sole discretion, terminate the Agreement for any reason, in whole or in part, by thirty (30) days written notice to the Contractor that the State is exercising its option to terminate the Agreement.

9.2 In the event of an early termination of this Agreement for any reason other than the completion of the Services, the Contractor shall, at the State's discretion, deliver to the Contracting Officer, not later than fifteen (15) days after the date of termination, a report ("Termination Report") describing in detail all Services performed, and the contract price earned, to and including the date of termination. The form, subject matter, content, and number of copies of the Termination Report shall be identical to those of any Final Report described in the attached EXHIBIT B. In addition, at the State's discretion, the Contractor shall, within 15 days of notice of early termination, develop and submit to the State a Transition Plan for services under the Agreement.

#### 10. DATA/ACCESS/CONFIDENTIALITY/PRESERVATION.

10.1 As used in this Agreement, the word "data" shall mean all information and things developed or obtained during the performance of, or acquired or developed by reason of, this Agreement, including, but not limited to, all studies, reports, files, formulae, surveys, maps, charts, sound recordings, video

recordings, pictorial reproductions, drawings, analyses, graphic representations, computer programs, computer printouts, notes, letters, memoranda, papers, and documents, all whether finished or unfinished.

10.2 All data and any property which has been received from the State or purchased with funds provided for that purpose under this Agreement, shall be the property of the State, and shall be returned to the State upon demand or upon termination of this Agreement for any reason.

10.3 Confidentiality of data shall be governed by N.H. RSA chapter 91-A or other existing law. Disclosure of data requires prior written approval of the State.

11. **CONTRACTOR'S RELATION TO THE STATE.** In the performance of this Agreement the Contractor is in all respects an independent contractor, and is neither an agent nor an employee of the State. Neither the Contractor nor any of its officers, employees, agents or members shall have authority to bind the State or receive any benefits, workers' compensation or other emoluments provided by the State to its employees.

#### 12. ASSIGNMENT/DELEGATION/SUBCONTRACTS.

12.1 The Contractor shall not assign, or otherwise transfer any interest in this Agreement without the prior written notice, which shall be provided to the State at least fifteen (15) days prior to the assignment, and a written consent of the State. For purposes of this paragraph, a Change of Control shall constitute assignment. "Change of Control" means (a) merger, consolidation, or a transaction or series of related transactions in which a third party, together with its affiliates, becomes the direct or indirect owner of fifty percent (50%) or more of the voting shares or similar equity interests, or combined voting power of the Contractor, or (b) the sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the Contractor.

12.2 None of the Services shall be subcontracted by the Contractor without prior written notice and consent of the State. The State is entitled to copies of all subcontracts and assignment agreements and shall not be bound by any provisions contained in a subcontract or an assignment agreement to which it is not a party.

13. **INDEMNIFICATION.** Unless otherwise exempted by law, the Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the State, its officers and employees, from and against any and all claims, liabilities and costs for any personal injury or property damages, patent or copyright infringement, or other claims asserted against the State, its officers or employees, which arise out of (or which may be claimed to arise out of) the acts or omission of the Contractor, or subcontractors, including but not limited to the negligence, reckless or intentional conduct. The State shall not be liable for any costs incurred by the Contractor arising under this paragraph 13. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to constitute a waiver of the sovereign immunity of the State, which immunity is hereby reserved to the State. This covenant in paragraph 13 shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

#### 14. INSURANCE.

14.1 The Contractor shall, at its sole expense, obtain and continuously maintain in force, and shall require any subcontractor or assignee to obtain and maintain in force, the following insurance:

14.1.1 commercial general liability insurance against all claims of bodily injury, death or property damage, in amounts of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate or excess; and

14.1.2 special cause of loss coverage form covering all property subject to subparagraph 10.2 herein, in an amount not less than 80% of the whole replacement value of the property.

14.2 The policies described in subparagraph 14.1 herein shall be on policy forms and endorsements approved for use in the State of New Hampshire by the N.H. Department of Insurance, and issued by insurers licensed in the State of New Hampshire.

14.3 The Contractor shall furnish to the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, a certificate(s) of insurance for all insurance required under this Agreement. Contractor shall also furnish to the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, certificate(s) of insurance for all renewal(s) of insurance required under this Agreement no later than ten (10) days prior to the expiration date of each insurance policy. The certificate(s) of insurance and any renewals thereof shall be attached and are incorporated herein by reference.

**15. WORKERS' COMPENSATION.**

15.1 By signing this agreement, the Contractor agrees, certifies and warrants that the Contractor is in compliance with or exempt from, the requirements of N.H. RSA chapter 281-A ("*Workers' Compensation*").

15.2 To the extent the Contractor is subject to the requirements of N.H. RSA chapter 281-A, Contractor shall maintain, and require any subcontractor or assignee to secure and maintain, payment of Workers' Compensation in connection with activities which the person proposes to undertake pursuant to this Agreement. The Contractor shall furnish the Contracting Officer identified in block 1.9, or his or her successor, proof of Workers' Compensation in the manner described in N.H. RSA chapter 281-A and any applicable renewal(s) thereof, which shall be attached and are incorporated herein by reference. The State shall not be responsible for payment of any Workers' Compensation premiums or for any other claim or benefit for Contractor, or any subcontractor or employee of Contractor, which might arise under applicable State of New Hampshire Workers' Compensation laws in connection with the performance of the Services under this Agreement.

16. **NOTICE.** Any notice by a party hereto to the other party shall be deemed to have been duly delivered or given at the time of mailing by certified mail, postage prepaid, in a United States Post Office addressed to the parties at the addresses given in blocks 1.2 and 1.4, herein.

17. **AMENDMENT.** This Agreement may be amended, waived or discharged only by an instrument in writing signed by the parties hereto and only after approval of such amendment, waiver or discharge by the Governor and Executive Council of

the State of New Hampshire unless no such approval is required under the circumstances pursuant to State law, rule or policy.

18. **CHOICE OF LAW AND FORUM.** This Agreement shall be governed, interpreted and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire, and is binding upon and inures to the benefit of the parties and their respective successors and assigns. The wording used in this Agreement is the wording chosen by the parties to express their mutual intent, and no rule of construction shall be applied against or in favor of any party. Any actions arising out of this Agreement shall be brought and maintained in New Hampshire Superior Court which shall have exclusive jurisdiction thereof.

19. **CONFLICTING TERMS.** In the event of a conflict between the terms of this P-37 form (as modified in EXHIBIT A) and/or attachments and amendment thereof, the terms of the P-37 (as modified in EXHIBIT A) shall control.

20. **THIRD PARTIES.** The parties hereto do not intend to benefit any third parties and this Agreement shall not be construed to confer any such benefit.

21. **HEADINGS.** The headings throughout the Agreement are for reference purposes only, and the words contained therein shall in no way be held to explain, modify, amplify or aid in the interpretation, construction or meaning of the provisions of this Agreement.

22. **SPECIAL PROVISIONS.** Additional or modifying provisions set forth in the attached EXHIBIT A are incorporated herein by reference.

23. **SEVERABILITY.** In the event any of the provisions of this Agreement are held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be contrary to any state or federal law, the remaining provisions of this Agreement will remain in full force and effect.

24. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement, which may be executed in a number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, constitutes the entire agreement and understanding between the parties, and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings with respect to the subject matter hereof.

**EXHIBIT A**

**Special Provisions**

1. This grant agreement may be terminated upon thirty (30) days written notice by either party.
2. Any funds advanced to "the Sub-Recipient" must be returned to "the State" if the grant agreement is terminated for any reason other than completion of the project.
3. Any funds advanced to "the Sub-Recipient" must be expended within thirty (30) days of receiving the advanced funds.
4. "The Sub-Recipient" agrees to have an audit conducted in compliance with OMB Circular 2 CFR 200, if applicable. If a compliance audit is not required, at the end of each audit period "the Sub-Recipient" will certify in writing that they have not expended the amount of federal funds that would require a compliance audit (\$750,000). If required, they will forward for review and clearance a copy of the completed audit(s) to "the State".

Additionally, "the Sub-Recipient" has or will notify their auditor of the above requirements prior to performance of the audit. "The Sub-Recipient" will also ensure that, if required, the entire grant period will be covered by a compliance audit, which in some cases will mean more than one audit must be submitted. "The Sub-Recipient" will advise the auditor to cite specifically that the audit was done in accordance with OMB Circular 2 CFR 200. "The Sub-Recipient" will also ensure that all records concerning this grant will be kept on file for a minimum of three (3) years from the end of this audit period.

5. The "Sub-Recipient" will be required to provide the formally approved Local Hazard Mitigation Plan electronically at the completion of the project.

**EXHIBIT B**

Scope of Work, Project Tasks & Deliverables, and Project Review & Conditions

**1. SCOPE OF WORK**

The Department of Safety, Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (hereinafter referred to as "the State") is awarding the **Town of Waterville Valley** (hereinafter referred to as "the Sub-Recipient") **\$8,399.70** within the Federal Fiscal Year 2023 Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant.

"The Sub-Recipient" shall utilize the above referenced funding to update the hazard mitigation plans for the Town of Waterville Valley in accordance with 44 CFR Part 201.

"The Sub-Recipient" agrees that the period of performance ends on September 23, 2027 and by that date the aforementioned hazard mitigation plans must be completed and have received formal approval by New Hampshire Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM). All completed invoices must be sent to "the State" by October 23, 2027, thirty (30) days after the period of performance ends and a final performance and expenditure report will be sent to "the State" by October 23, 2027 .

**2. PROJECT TASKS AND DELIVERABLES – NEW LOCAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN**

Project tasks and deliverables within this section are to be referenced for the reimbursement process. Per the Scope of Work, "the Sub-Recipient" is required to develop/update the community's local hazard mitigation plan in accordance with 44 CFR Part 201 to ensure formal approval.

The Town/City, NH will prepare a Local Hazard Mitigation Plan Update in accordance with FEMA guidelines for Hazard Mitigation Planning. The Town/City may be assisted, by a vendor of their choice, for this scope of work. The Town/City's updated plan will address mitigation of multiple natural hazards that may affect the community, including Avalanche, Coastal Flooding, Inland Flooding, Drought, Earthquake, Extreme Temperatures, High Wind Events, Landslide, Lightning, Severe Winter Weather, Solar Storms and Space Weather, Tropical and Post-Tropical Cyclones, and Wildfires.

The planning process will include the following actions and elements:

**Task 1-3**

**1. Grant Award and Contracting:**

The community will procure services to facilitate this planning process update

- Official Notification of Award
- Provide Contractor Selection to NH HSEM
- Execute a contract

The vendor will document the process used to develop the updated plan, including but not limited to:

- How the plan update was prepared
- Who was involved in this process
- How the public was involved (i.e., Community outreach, local planning team participation)

**3. Convene a local Hazard Mitigation Planning Committee:**

The Town/City will convene a local Hazard Mitigation Planning Team. Members should include a cross-section of the community, such as residents, government officials, community leaders and business owners. This team will serve as a liaison to the vendor and assist in the plan update by providing access to relevant local data, facilitating community input on plan recommendations and priorities, reviewing draft products, and assisting with outreach to community stakeholders. With the vendor's facilitation and technical assistance, the Town/City Hazard Mitigation Planning Team will:

- Develop a mission statement
- Assign roles and responsibilities
- Develop a specific timeline for planning activities
- Hold a minimum of two community public meetings during the planning process update; one during the production of the plan update, and one during the review of the draft plan update,
- Solicit input from key stakeholders in the community, including business associations, local or regional institutions, local NGO's, and residents.
- Conduct local outreach to stakeholders through postings on the municipal web site, outreach to local print and/or online press, and use of local access cable TV where available. Outreach to neighboring communities will also be conducted.
- Provide input regarding the feasibility and prioritization of mitigation measures
- Review the draft plan update and its goals and proposed mitigation projects
- Oversee the implementation, maintenance and updating of the plan update

**Task 4. Revisit the Hazard Profiles for each Hazard that impacts the community:**

- Using the best available existing data, the vendor will update a map of areas affected by multiple natural hazards for the Town/City. A set of hazard maps will be included within the updated Hazard Mitigation plan, and GIS files will be made available to the Town/City for integration with their other community plans. These maps will be the basis for the communities known hazards. The hazard identification update will include an assessment of the community's risks that summarizes the vulnerability of each hazard based on the location, extent, probability, and severity of the hazards. A vulnerability analysis will be conducted; your vendor may consider using FEMA's HAZUS-MH, as well as, a GIS map analysis to delineate those critical facilities that are located within mapped hazard areas.
- The Town/City will update the description and prioritization of the natural hazards that have occurred within the community since the last plan update.

The addresses and associated data will be provided, upon request to, the community by the State NFIP Coordinator.
- Land use maps that depict the location of developed land uses, delineated by categories based on use (e.g., residential, commercial, industrial, institutional, other public use, etc.) and how it intersects with known hazards.
- Anticipated future land use areas and how they intersect with known hazards.

**Task 6: Vulnerability:**

Based on the previous information from Task 5, the Town/City will update the overview of each of the specific hazards and the community's vulnerability to those specific hazards. This vulnerability assessment, if possible, will include:

- Problem Statements: These will summarize the biggest issues for the community in terms of; Types and numbers of buildings, infrastructure, and critical facilities located in the hazard areas.
- All existing multiple hazard protection measures within the community, including protective measures under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).
- A description of each measure, the method of enforcement, and/or the point of contact responsible for implementation of each measure.
- Historical performance of each measure and a description of improvements or changes needed.
- General description of land uses and development trends to incorporate future land use decisions.

**OTHERS PRESENT:** Mark Decoteau (Town Manager), David Noyes (Public Safety Director), Meagn Boobar (Public Works Director) and Sharon Charron (Executive Assistant).

**1. Call to Order –** Bob Fries, Vice-Chair of the Selectboard, states that this is an in-person meeting, and YouTube LIVE is also being used. The Chair called the meeting to order at 3:00 pm.

**2. Privilege of the Floor • 0:00:40**

- No topics were presented from the public for discussion.

**3. New Business • 0:00:46**

**War Service Credit Application • 00:00:47**

- Mark Decoteau presented an Exemption/Credits application from C. Cook for a \$500 war service credit was reviewed and met state criteria.
- Bob Fries made a motion to approve the credit for \$500 for War Service. Wendi Rathgeber seconded the motion, and a 2-0 voice vote followed for approval.

**RFQ Posting for Land Use and Planning Services • 00:03:22**

- Mark Decoteau stated that a subcommittee will handle the RFQ process for selecting a firm to provide comprehensive land use and planning services.
  - Mark explained that the decision to use an RFQ instead of an RFP aims to select the most qualified firm for professional services.

**~~Local Hazard Mitigation Plan Update • 00:08:02~~**

- Chief Dave Noyes shared that the town was awarded an \$8,700 grant to update the Hazard Mitigation Plan, requiring a local in-kind match of time.
  - Local stakeholders will participate in meetings to review and update the plan, focusing on recommendations for disaster prevention.
  - The meetings are conducted by a third-party vendor who specializes in updating the plan and meetings will occur over the course of a year.

- o The plan will include recommendations for improvements. A secondary egress from town was discussed and is still a primary concern that will continue to be recommended.
- ~~The Select Board, in a majority vote, accepted the terms of the Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) as presented in the amount of \$8,399.70 for updating the local hazard mitigation plan. Furthermore, the Board acknowledges that the total cost of the project will be \$11,199.60, in which the town will be responsible for a 25% match (\$2,799.90). David Noyes, Waterville Valley Director of Public Safety, is authorized to sign all documents related to the grant.~~

#### 4. Old Business

##### Road Project Update - Jennings Peak Wetlands Permit • 00:23:40

- Mark Decoteau shared that the four waiver applications for wetlands permits related to Jennings Peak Road project were denied, necessitating additional engineering work costing \$16,500.
  - o Mark noted that future road projects will require either a waiver or a permit for maintenance on open drainage ditches exceeding 50 feet, depending on location.
  - o This may delay the Jennings Peak project, originally scheduled for spring, due to engineering work backlog of three to six months.

##### Transfer Station Project • 00:29:00

- Megan Boobar shared that the gates for the Transfer Station enclosure are tentatively scheduled for October 22<sup>nd</sup>. Once they are installed, the project will be finished.

##### Wastewater Project Update • 00:31:49

- Mark Decoteau reported that Black & Veatch engineers have discussed two recommended options for the wastewater plant, and currently are leaning towards a membrane bioreactor.
  - o A follow-up meeting with DES is scheduled for October 21st to review the technical memo and conceptual layouts, with a presentation planned for October 30<sup>th</sup>.

##### Lead and Copper Rule Revisions • 00:39:03

- Mark Decoteau shared that the new EPA lead and copper rules require a comprehensive survey of service lines, starting October 16th, as part of a 10-year process.
  - o The town is responsible for documenting the material of service lines, and if homeowners cannot provide photo/visual evidence, the town may need to excavate areas to verify the materials for compliance.
  - o A notice will be enclosed with the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter water/sewer bills informing all property owners of the requirement and the changes.

##### Dumpster Review Discussion • 00:49:14

- Wendi Rathgeber shared that the Public Works Department conducted a thorough assessment of dumpsters in town.
  - Megan Boobar added that many commercial dumpsters lack the required screening which raised enforcement questions the existing dumpster ordinance or modify the ordinance.
  - The Board discussed recommendations for durable enclosure designs including alternatives to alternative types of doors. The non-conforming enclosures were identified, with approximately 10 out of 30 needing maintenance work.
  - Additionally, the visibility of dumpsters in Town Square complicates compliance with the ordinance.
- The Board agreed that the Municipal Solid Waste Group should continue their discussions and provide recommendations for improvements.

## 5. Department Head Updates

### Public Works Department • 00:58:37

- Megan Boobar reported that DPW is preparing for winter by maintaining equipment, addressing ditch lines.
  - Shared-pedestrian Lane delineators will be removed after October 14<sup>th</sup>.
  - Pothole filling and roadside maintenance is ongoing.
  - The staffing of the department is stable, with efforts to fill a temporary position due to sick leave.
- Megan stated that the markings along Tripoli Rd. are for the Forest Service for reviewing road maintenance in 50' sections.

### Public Safety Department • 01:02:45

- Chief Dave Noyes shared that the ladder truck was repaired and in back in service. The repairs took place in Littleton and the truck was out of service for one day.
- Dave shared that the Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid (LRMFA) relocation in Laconia due to the State's intent to sell the property. There is potential financial impact to member towns to relocate LRMFA dispatch center, but decisions have not been finalized.
  - Dave shared a Special Assessment may be imposed on the member towns and expressed concern that smaller member towns might not be able to absorb increases and instead choose to withdraw, which would further increase costs to the other member towns.
- Dave shared that the Public Safety Department took delivery of an EV emergency response kit.
  - It is a single-use item due to contamination from battery runoff.
  - There is a need to explore potential cost recovery from insurance companies for the use of this equipment. Template ordinances for cost recovery are currently unknown.
- Most annual life safety inspections on the valley floor have been completed, with only a few locations remaining.
  - The Schwinde Hutte inspection was successfully conducted, and preparations for Schwinde Fest are underway.
- Dave announced that research is ongoing for vendors and grants for body cameras, with a proposal expected for the next budget. Body cameras are seen as a liability reducer and are becoming standard in police work. The estimated annual cost for body cameras is around \$10,000, including data storage and leasing options, for ten cameras.
- Dave stated that the current Tasers are now 8 years old. New tasers that can be integrated with body cameras, depending upon the manufacturer capabilities, are also being researched.

#### **Recreation Department • 01:18:45**

- Mark Decoteau shared that Brooke and her staff are busy with preparations for the Fall Foliage Road Race and holiday weekend events.
- The afterschool program has 11 students and is going well.
- A part-time employee was hired to assist with activities and events.

#### **Municipal Services Department • 01:20:18**

- Mark Decoteau announced that Dylan is at a State Certification Meeting.
- Black and Veatch met with Dylan and Richard Tucker to review current wastewater treatment plant operations.

#### **Administration Department • 01:20:49**

- Mark Decoteau shared that the MS-1 has been completed and was submitted to NH-Department of Revenue in preparation for Tax Rate Setting.
- The 3<sup>rd</sup> 2024 Quarter Water & Sewer will be mailed by the 16<sup>th</sup> of October. The warrant was presented to the Board for their signatures.
  - The water department is tracking 80% of estimated revenues, while the sewer department is at 75%.
  - Trash fees are currently about 5-10% short, primarily due to low pay-as-you-go charges.
  - Three new services were brought online during the quarter, which will contribute to future revenue.

#### **6. Minutes • 01:23:05**

- The 9/18/24 are not yet complete and approval is deferred to the next meeting.

#### **7. Financial Report • 01:23:17**

- Mark Decoteau shared the financial report with the Board.
  - The Motor Vehicle revenue was updated to \$175K that is not reflected in the current financial report.
- The Rooms & Meals revenue from the State usually is received near the end of the year.
- The revenue from the Sale of the Public Works truck needs to be reallocated to “Sale of Town Property” from Miscellaneous Revenue.
- The revenues from WVRA for the Freedom Passes for the Recreation (Boats, etc.) was not complete yet.
- General Overhead showed an increase over last month. Mark will inquire as to why and will report back to the Board.
