REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the New Hampshire Department of Justice (DOJ) to amend existing subgrants from the Comprehensive, Opioid, Stimulant, Substance Abuse Site-based Program (COSSAP), from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance, with Amoskeag Health, Manchester, NH, (Vendor #157274-B001), by decreasing the price limitation by \$173,092 from \$1,251,686 to \$1,078,594 and the Berlin Police Department, Berlin, NH, (Vendor #177362-B007), by decreasing the price limitation amount by \$134,963.56 from \$347,226.68 to \$212,263.12, and by extending the end date from September 30, 2025 to September 30, 2026, effective upon Governor and Executive Council approval. The original contract was approved by Governor and Executive Council on June 1, 2022, Item #123, and amended on May 29, 2024, item #005U. **100% Federal Funds.**

EXPLANATION

The U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance, COSSAP funding is specifically designed to help lower recidivism rates of overdose victims and provide support to families of those struggling with substance use disorder (SUD) through enhancing and expanding the Prevention, Enforcement, and Treatment (PET) program. This program funds dedicated police officers to respond to overdose calls to provide resources. These officers can assist individuals suffering from SUD, and affected family members, by connecting them with needed resources. The officers also focus on child family members to identify adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) with a goal of preventing children from becoming future users.

New Hampshire Police Departments suffered a shortage of staffing and turnover causing delays in implementing the PET Program with the communities. Due to these shortages several of the Police Departments are de-obligating funds as they will be unable to spend the funds during the extension period. The de-obligated funds will be utilized by the Police Departments with staff in the PET Officer position through the extension period.

The time extension for Amoskeag Health will allow continued funding for a full-time Adverse Childhood Experiences Response Team Technical Assistant to meet immediate needs of children and families exposed to adverse childhood experiences. The Berlin Police Department will use the time extension to continue funding PET police officers conducting PET program activities, purchasing equipment, and supplies to conduct services for the funded project and address the immediate needs of children and family exposed to ACEs.

In the event that federal funds are no longer available, general funds will not be requested to support this program.

NH DOJ has determined that the vendors have secured the required levels of insurance and have provided evidence of authority to execute and be bound by the contract. Also, Amoskeag Health is a non-profit organization, and the NH DOJ has confirmed the vendor is registered and in good standing with the Department of Justice's Charitable Division. The documents supporting these assertions are available at NH DOJ, for review upon request.

AMENDMENT TO GRANT AGREEMENT

This AMENDMENT TO GRANT AGREEMENT (the "Amendment") is entered into and effective as of the Effective Date (defined below) by and between as of the NEW HAMPSHIRE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE ("State") and the BERLIN POLICE DEPARTMENT ("Subrecipient"). State and Subrecipient are sometimes referred to herein singularly as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Parties entered into the Grant Agreement as approved by the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire on June 1, 2022 at Item # 123 (the "Agreement"), wherein the State agreed grant, and Subrecipient agreed to accept, certain sums upon the terms and conditions set forth therein; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Paragraph 20 of the Agreement, the Parties wish to amend the terms and conditions of the Agreement as further specified herein;

NOW THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration exchanged, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby conclusively acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. Amendment to Block 1.7. The Grant Completion Date of September 30, 2025 as set forth in Block 1.8 of the Agreement is extended to September 30, 2026.
2. Amendment to Block 1.8. The Grant Limitation as set forth in Block 1.8 of the Agreement is to decrease from \$347,226.68 to \$212,263.12.
3. Amendment to Exhibit C. The Grant Completion Date of September 30, 2025 as set forth in Paragraph 3(a) of Exhibit C to the Agreement is extended to September 30, 2026.
4. Amendment to Exhibit C. Awarded amount as set forth in Paragraph 3(a) of Exhibit C to the Agreement is to decrease from \$347,226.68 to \$212,263.12.
5. Effect of Amendment. Except as provided in this Amendment, the terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect for all purposes.
6. Construction. The recitals set forth at the outset of this Amendment are a part of this Amendment, as fully as if set forth in their entirety in the body hereof. The captions or headings in this Amendment are for ease of reference only, and no caption or heading shall affect in any way the interpretation, meaning, or construction of this Amendment. Capitalized terms that are not defined within the text of this Amendment shall have the same meanings respectively ascribed to them in the Agreement.

7. Effective Date. The terms and conditions of this Amendment shall become effective on the date that it is approved the Governor and Executive Council of the State of New Hampshire (the "Effective Date").

8. Counterparts; Facsimile and Electronic Signatures. This Amendment may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same Amendment. A facsimile or portable document format (PDF) signature on this Amendment shall be equivalent to, and have the same force and effect as, an original signature. In accordance with the New Hampshire Uniform Electronic Transactions Act, RSA 294-E:1 *et seq.*, the Parties hereby agree that this Amendment may be signed electronically, including any exhibits, schedules, addenda, or other attachments referenced herein.

REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the New Hampshire Department of Justice (DOJ) to amend existing subgrants with Amoskeag Health, Manchester, NH (Vendor #157274-B001), the Berlin Police Department, Berlin, NH (Vendor #177362-B007), and the Belmont Police Department, Belmont, NH (Vendor #177361-B001), approved by Governor and Executive Council on June 1, 2022, item #123, by extending the end date only from September 30, 2024 to September 30, 2025, from the Comprehensive, Opioid, Stimulant, Substance Abuse Site-based Program (COSSAP), for the purpose of continuing to fund enhancements to the Presentation Enforcement and Treatment Program (PET), effective upon Governor and Executive Council approval through September 30, 2025. No additional funds are involved in this time extension. 100% Federal Funds.

EXPLANATION

The U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance, COSSAP funding is specifically designed to help lower recidivism rates of overdose victims and provide support to families of those struggling with substance use disorder (SUD) through enhancing and expanding the PET program. This program funds dedicated police officers to respond to overdose calls and also provides other resources. These officers can assist the SUD user, and affected family members, by connecting them with needed resources. The officers also focus on child family members to identify adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) with a goal of preventing children from becoming future users.



EXPLANATION

COSSAP is specifically designed to help lower recidivism rates of overdose victims and provide support to families of those struggling with substance use disorder (SUD) through enhancing and expanding the PET program; mainly to fund dedicated police resources responding to overdose calls. The PET program identifies that police officers in New Hampshire

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are often the first, and sometimes only, responders to a scene where drugs are involved. Instead of treating the overdose situation as an investigation into criminal activity, officers can assist SUD users and affected family members by connecting them with needed resources. This program also identifies adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) to deter and prevent children from becoming future SUD users.


The Manchester Adverse Childhood Experiences Response Team Technical Assistance Center (ACERT TAC) will utilize funds for a program model that uses a multi-disciplinary approach to meet the immediate needs of children and families exposed to adverse childhood experiences. Manchester ACERT TAC will also use funds to enhance the PET program.

Belmont and Berlin Police Departments will hire PET police officers and purchase equipment/supplies needed for the PET project. Amoskeag Health will use funds to hire an ACERT TAC specialist. Amoskeag Health will also use funds for training and data collection.

In the event that federal funds are no longer available, general funds will not be requested to support this program.

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

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

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
