REQUESTED ACTION

Authorize the Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) to **retroactively** pay the fiscal year 2027 membership dues to the Northeast Environmental Enforcement Project (NEEP), Hilliard, OH (VC# 270787-B001) in the amount of \$4,000 for the period July 1, 2026, through June 30, 2027, effective upon Governor and Council approval. 37.5% Federal funds and 62.5% Hazardous Waste funds.

Funding is available in the accounts as follows.

EXPLANATION

NHDES and the Attorney General's Office (AGO) benefit greatly from membership in NEEP, and the value of training benefits derived from membership far exceed the modest dues. NEEP was formed in 1980 to address the need for interstate cooperation among environmental enforcement officials in the northeast to investigate and prosecute environmental crimes. New Hampshire's membership entity is NHDES, responsible for environmental regulatory activities. The AGO is also represented under this membership, responsible for civil and criminal investigation and prosecution. NEEP provides its members with high-quality training programs and responsive information services that NHDES relies upon to successfully train regulatory and enforcement staff. This request is **retroactive** because the invoice was not received in time to process this request before June 30, 2026.

Listed below are answers to standard questions required for Governor and Council organization dues and membership approval submissions:

1. **How long has this organization been in existence and how long has this agency been a member of this organization?** The organization has been in existence since 1980, and New Hampshire has been a member since its inception.

2. **Is there any other organization which provides the same or similar benefits which your agency belongs to?** No.
3. **How many other states belong to this organization and is your agency the sole New Hampshire state agency that is a member?** 18 entities representing 10 states and the District of Columbia are NEEP members. NHDES holds the entity membership and under this membership the AGO is also represented and able to take advantage of NEEP's services. NEEP is one of the three Regional Environmental Enforcement Associations. The other associations are the Southern Environmental Enforcement Network and the Western States Project.
4. **How is the dues structure established? (Standard fee for all states, based on population, based on other criteria, etc.)** The dues are a structured fee of \$4,000 per state with a population of less than 5 million people, \$7,000 for a population between 5 to 10 million and \$10,000 for a population of 10 million or more.
5. **What benefit does the state receive from participating in this membership?** The state receives benefits from membership in several ways. The state takes full advantage of the high-quality training programs provided to our regulators, investigators, and attorneys. In FY27, NHDES staff will have access to in-person training courses including Environmental Scene Investigation and Advanced Environmental Crimes Training, as well as access to numerous virtual trainings. In addition, New Hampshire is scheduled for a priority training course in FY27 that will be held in New Hampshire and tailored to the needs of NHDES and AGO staff. NEEP's Board of Directors and state representatives have a conference meeting once per year, which provides up-to-date information on national environmental enforcement issues, information exchange and NEEP business. Networking with NEEP and the other Regional Environmental Enforcement Association members has been an important resource in the success of New Hampshire's environmental enforcement programs.
6. **Are training or educational/research materials included in the membership? If so, is the cost included? Explain in detail.** Yes, NEEP provides training materials to its members at its courses and meetings. The courses are free for New Hampshire as a member, and training course attendees are reimbursed for their travel, hotel, and meal expenses when trainings are held in-person.
7. **Is the membership required to receive any federal grants or required in order to receive or participate in licensing or certification exams? Explain.** No.
8. **Is there any travel included with this membership fee? Explain in detail any travel to include the number of employees involved, the number of trips, destination if known and purposes of membership supported trips.** Yes, NEEP has one conference meeting each year for state representatives and board members. This conference alternates between being held virtually and in-person. One representative is reimbursed by NEEP for their expenses to attend the in-

person meeting. For training events that are held in-person, NEEP reimburses all attendees for their travel, hotel, and meal expenses.

9. **Which state agency employees are directly involved with this organization? (Indicate if they are members, voting members, committee members, and/or officers of the organization.)**

10. **Explain in detail any negative impact to the State if the Agency did not belong to this organization.** The state would not have up-to-date information on important state environmental enforcement cases or the ability to network with members of the Regional Environmental Enforcement Associations on multi-state environmental investigations. Most importantly, New Hampshire would lose the opportunity to train its staff through NEEP's training courses and representative conference meetings. The NHDES and AGO have been members of NEEP since its inception and its environmental enforcement programs have benefited and will continue to benefit greatly from the training, networking and other services provided by NEEP. If New Hampshire ceased its membership in NEEP, there is no other organization that could provide a comparable service, and the effectiveness of our environmental enforcement programs would be diminished.

NEEP membership provides New Hampshire with an outstanding service to remain current on new environmental enforcement developments in the regulatory, investigative, and legal specialties. Membership in the past has been of great benefit to New Hampshire as we have been able to learn from other NEEP states' experiences and share such up-to-date information on a national basis with the other Regional Environmental Enforcement Associations. These dues are a very small investment for the value received from this organization in terms of sustaining our knowledge and ability to investigate and prosecute environmental crimes through administrative, civil, and criminal processes.
